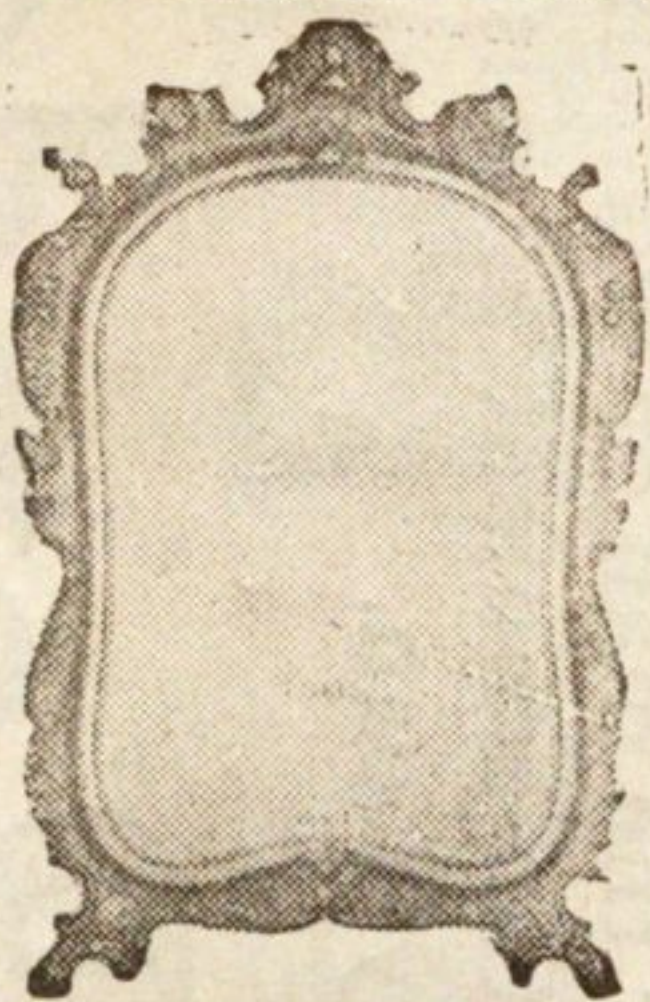

The Rush C. Buttler family of Locust road, have returned from Washington, D. C.

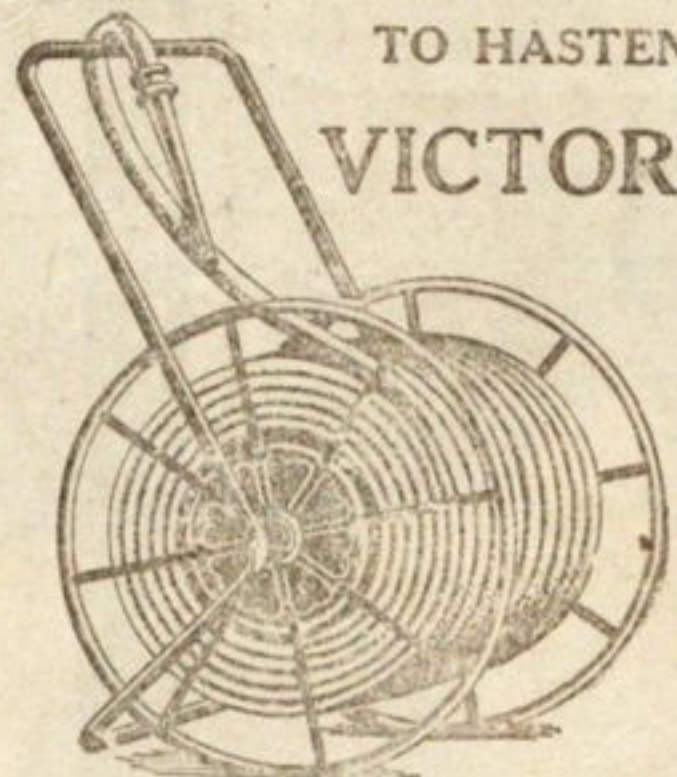
