## BOOST CAMP GRANT PLANS FOR FOURTH

War Emergency Union Appoints Committee to act on Village's Share in Celebration

Plans are underway for a monster farewell athletic carnival and god-speed celebration at Camp Grant on July Fourth.

Winnetka, together with other towns of Illinois and Wisconsin, has been asked to assist the project by the appointment of a committee of persons some of whose sons are at Camp Grant.

The War Emergency Union has asked the following men to represent the Village on this committee, Fred Copeland, chairman, Frank Bissell and John Kassner.

**Many Big Events**  
The following gives information as to the events. Further notice will be given later.

Officers and men of the Eighty-sixth national army division plan to shatter all state records in the celebration of Independence Day as a last farewell to Camp Grant and to the folks at home before selective fighting men of Illinois and Wisconsin leave their training camp for action overseas.

Plans for a gigantic farewell celebration in the cantonment which will pack every minute of July Fourth, from daylight until tattoo, are complete and have received the enthusiastic sanction of Major C. H. Martin.

**Athletic Carnival**  
The celebration will take the form of a "great soldiers' athletic carnival, in which every one of the 50,000 or more officers and enlisted men in the army city will participate. At dawn it is planned to swing the entire division with every ounce of equipment into formation for a mammoth parade and review through the streets of Rockford.

About 30,000 men under heavy marching order will march in the column, which will require four hours or more to pass a given point. The column will be reviewed in Rockford by General Martin and his staff in company with Governor Lowden and other state and national leaders, who will be invited to attend the carnival as division guests of honor.

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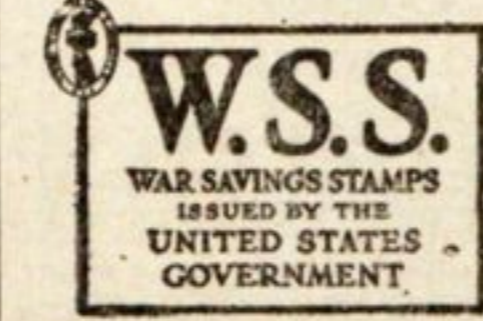
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It is planned to start the long column from Camp Grant shortly after 5 a. m. in order to complete the parade before noon.

In the early afternoon the division's baseball team will meet a team of like caliber on the camp diamond.

**Big Boxing Card**  
At 4 o'clock sharp the feature event of the day, a big boxing card and the official dedication of Camp Grant's open air boxing arena, will be run off. Construction of this arena is already under way. It will be built in the natural amphitheater formed by the Rock river bluff near the base hospital site, and will seat 15,000 people, with standing room for as many more on the tableland above. Seats will be clamped into the hillside which slopes down to a squared ring built at the river's edge as a permanent outdoor boxing ground.

The entire program will be carried out for the benefit of the overseas athletic fund of the 86th division. Every event with the exception of reserved seats for the boxing card will be free, but it is expected that more than \$50,000 will pour into the fund through the auction of boxing tickets in Chicago and elsewhere.

The executive committee handling all phases of the big event includes, Emil C. Wetten, chairman; Lieutenant J. E. Eddy, athletic director; Oscar G. Rorem, treasurer; Spearman Lewis, managing director and Mrs. Sam Chase, chairman of the woman's committee. The committee is practically the same that handled

the successful Grant, Custer football game in Chicago last fall. Executive offices have been opened at 108 South La Salle street, Chicago.

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
