Women Are Cow Testers

Five women cow testers have recently been appointed by dairy agents of the United States Department of Agriculture, co-operating with the State agricultural colleges and the State dairymen's associations. One of these has been placed in Iowa and the other four are in-Wisconsin, where the first woman cow tester in the country is now starting her second year of work. These women have received training in agricultural high schools or have taken work in dairying at short courses, and all of them have been in close touch with dairy work.

Save Clothing For War

The women of Uinta County, Utah, have saved \$2,500 during the last month by remodeling hats and clothing under the supervision of the county home demonstration agent. The work is carried on at meetings to which the women bring their materials and work under the agent's supervision. Three hundred and fifty hats have been remodeled-a saving of at least \$1,500-dresses have been made from coats and suits, waists from and shirts, children's clothing from women's dresses, boy's trousers from men's clothing, and boy's overcoats from men's old coats.
