Our stores will dwindle, our big boxes of civilian clothing empty like magic as camion after camion returns to the Alcazar for a new load. Please help us, and through us, this so sorely tried population of the Aisne and Marne. And remember that "who gives quickly gives twice". Exportation of Silver

Sixty-four million silver dollars have been melted into bullion by the United States Treasury, most of which has been exported to India. Fifty-eight million dollars of silver certificates have been withdrawn from circulation and destroyed as the silver on which they were secured was melted down. The Treasury still holds 426,000,000 silver dollars, against which \$390,000,000 in silver certificates are outstanding. New Federal reserve bank notes of the denominations of \$1 and \$2 are being issued to replace the silver certificates withdrawn.

Army Theaters Prosperous

Uncle Sam's training camp theaters will do a \$3,500,000 business in the first year of operation under the Commission on Training Camp Activities if the people back home will provide the soldiers with their tickets by sending them Smileage books, says the Smileage Division of the commission. Smileage coupons to the amount of \$355,000 have been redeemed to date.

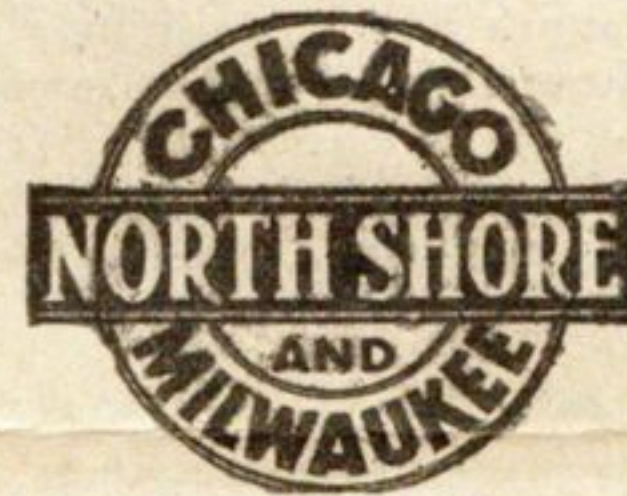
