

## Financial Statement of the War Emergency Union

The general character of the work of the War Emergency Union is indicated in the following statement and the figures show that the account is an active one and not an idle one. These accounts are audited and quarterly reports from them sent to the State Council of Defense. Reflected in this expense account is the personal service which has been rendered by the citizens of Winnetka co-operating through the Union in the various war activities. This work and this money has enabled Winnetka to keep every one of its men in service supplied with personal comforts; to supply our local branch of the Illinois Militia with overcoats, as well as assisting in other equipment; to finance the expenses of the campaigns for Liberty Bonds, Red Cross Funds, Y. M. C. A., Belgian and Italian Relief, as well as some local war relief; to assist in the dissemination of information furnished by the government; to assist in the organization of the War Gardens which now cover our territory; to maintain a record of the service of all Winnetka citizens; and each week to keep open house for a large number of sailors from Great Lakes station. It has enabled also the maintenance of a central office with a Secretary in daily charge and a large corps of volunteer workers whose activities make the office a very busy place.

### SERVICE FLAG STARS AND THOSE ENTITLED TO THEM

According to further unofficial regulations of the Judge Advocate General's department, the honor of representation on the service flag should be limited to those going forth to the service from the home, family, club, church or other organization.

As to service flags flown from homes, the custom is that fathers, sons, husbands and brothers may be represented on the service flag whether going directly to the service from the particular household or not, but that others not so related—cousins, nephews, etc.—must have actually been a part of the household and gone into service from such household.

No club or other organization should display service flags unless the individuals represented by the stars are actually members of the club or organization flying the flag.

### FIGURES SHOW WEALTH OF THE BELLIGERENTS

The Entente Allies—including Russia and including only those British dominions which are self-governing and only the United States proper—have 11,000,000 square miles of territory, 303,000,000 people, and \$495,000,000,000 of national wealth.

The Central Powers have 1,250,000 square miles of territory, 147,000,000 people, and \$134,000,000,000 of national wealth.

The entente owe an aggregate debt of \$69,000,000,000, which is about 14 per cent of their total assets. The Central Powers owe \$37,000,000,000, or 28 per cent of their national wealth.

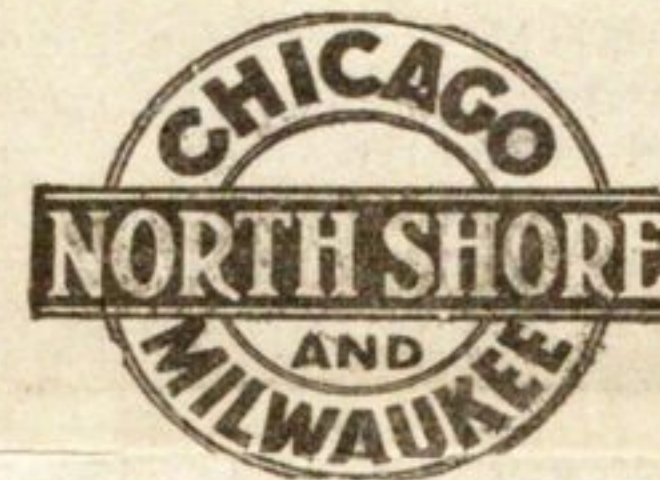
