

ANNOUNCE SPECIAL WAR EXPOSITION PROGRAMS

Schedule Of The Special Days For The Chicago Exposition; Aviation, With Allied War Heroes As Pilots. A Big Feature

While the World's greatest war exposition is open in Grant Park, Chicago, the world's largest flag will float above the grounds.

There is no longer any question about it being the greatest undertaking of its kind ever seen, for the show is open and speaks for itself. There are trophies and more trophies—all the panoply and implements of war, taken from the enemy. There are also all the allies' implements of war—all of them from the big guns to rifles; from tanks to gas masks and trench knives. Also there are at the show the men who use the implements—American soldiers and sailors in force, with a sprinkling of the uniforms of the allies, British, French, Belgian and Italian. These men will demonstrate the uses of the tools, big guns and little, gas masks and airplanes.

Demonstrate Air Fighting

The flying machine part of the show will be one of its big features, and every phase of air fighting is to be illustrated before the exposition is ended. Not only will American air craft be shown daily—in the air—but there are on the program flights by the cracks of the French, British and Italian air services, who will use all kinds of machines from the little and swift Bristols and Spads to the heavy Caproni bombers. One of the identical machines of the Italian squadron, under command of Gabriel D'Annunzio, which recently flew over Vienna and dropped pamphlets, will be here. It is now in the United States and on the way to Chicago.

One of the other big special days is to be Marne day, September 6. That day is not only the fourth anniversary of the first battle of the Marne, but is also the 161st anniversary of the birthday of Lafayette.

One of the other big special days will be Pershing—otherwise All-American—day September 13, upon which the American Army and Navy will be in charge of the program.

- September 8. Sons in Service and Scandinavian Day.
- September 9. Children's Day.

- September 11. Y. M. C. A. and Knights of Columbus Day.
- September 12. Italian Day.
- September 13. Pershing Day. Special army and navy features.
- September 14. Conservation and Woman's Day. Czecho-Slavs and Jugo-Slavs especially invited to attend.
- September 15. Victory Day. Poles, Lithuanians, Ukrainians, Russians and Letts to attend.

ARMY MAIL SERVICE IMPROVED

Mothers and fathers, sisters and sweethearts can be assured that the letters they are writing to men in France these days are delivered without delays of the past. They can be assured, further, that fewer letters will now be lost in transit.

Real mail trains of the American variety (with sorting of letters and packages going on as the trains move, are now in service in France. Expert railway mail clerks "from home" do the sorting.

Such trains are in operation between base ports and Tours where the Central Post office of the A. E. F. is located; between Tours and Paris, and between Tours and C. H. Q. Others are to follow.
