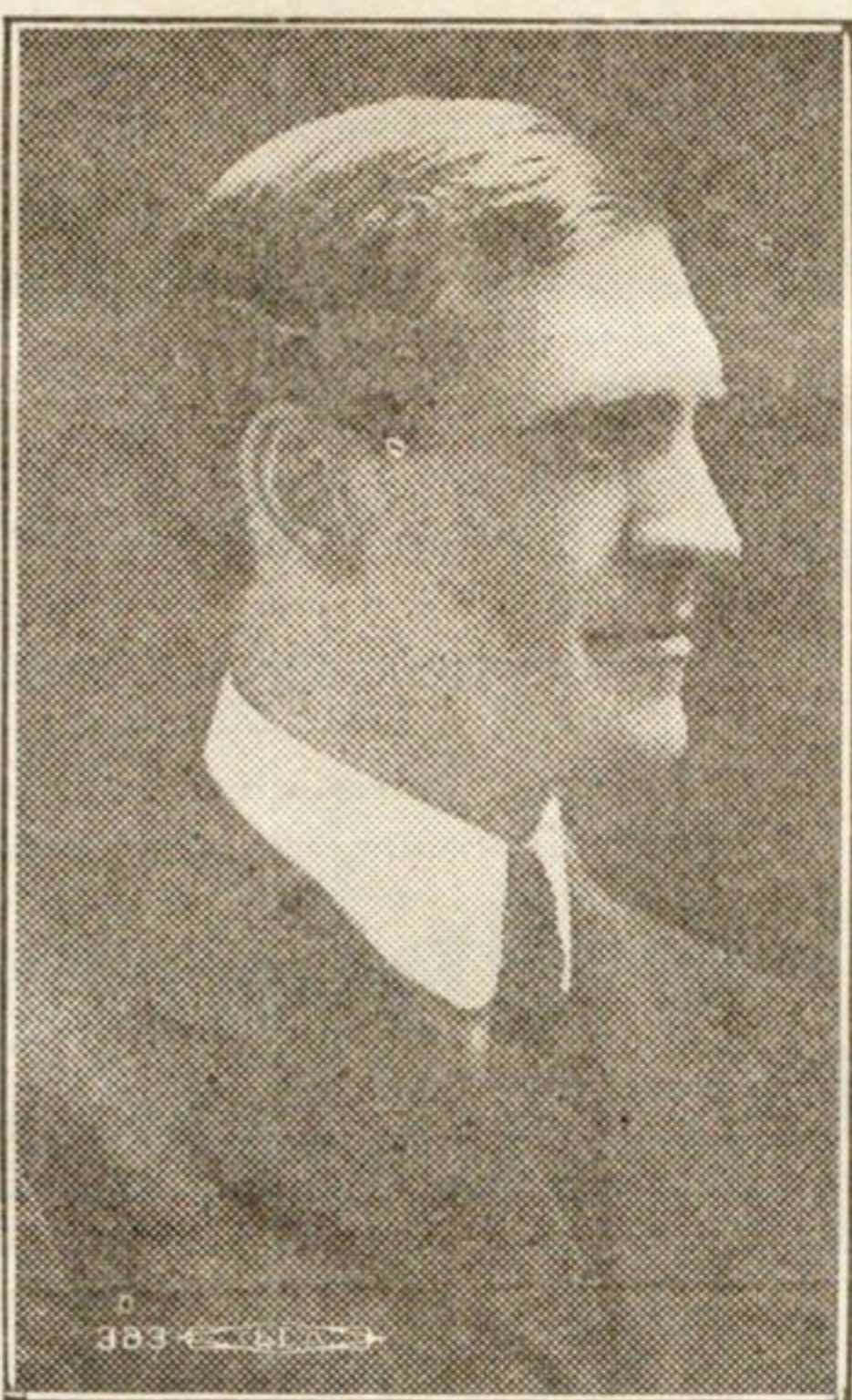
The Harry P. Clarke family will return this week from Bridgeville, Del., where they have been spending the summer, to their home at 958 Spruce street.

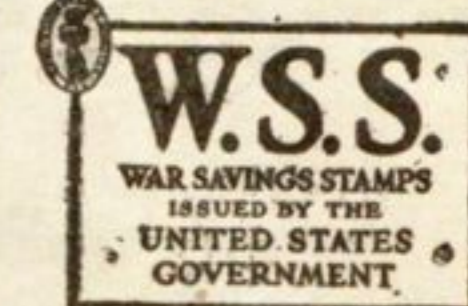
