Food Sales in Open Air

A study club in Barnstable county, Mass., formed by the home demonstration agent under the supervision of the Department of Agriculture in connection with the State Agricultural college at Amherst, held all summer food exhibits or food sales in front of the town hall at Provincetown. To attract and increase interest demonstrations and lectures have been given. Recipes for the conservation of foods on exhibit also have been given out.

Spoiled Potatoes Good for Starch

Starch in potatoes is not destroyed by the common decay-producing fungi or by freezing. It has been found in recent studies conducted by the United States Department of Agriculture in laboratory tests that it is possible to recover most of the starch from frozen and rotten potatoes, which lead specialists of the department to suggest that an attempt should be made to salvage the great quantities of spoiled stock now rejected and dumped on the terminal markets.

OUTLINE POST-WAR DUTIES FOR WOMEN

Women's Committee Chairmen Throughout the State Urged to Keep Up Effort As Part of Reconstruction Work

As the program outlined for the social service department of the Woman's committee, State Council of Defense, is as much a peace time as a war time program, the need for the work is not changed by the signing of the armistice. The department therefore urges that the social service chairmen throughout the state renew their efforts, as promoting the work for their communities will be an important contribution to the work of reconstruction.

"We wish to emphasize the work already outlined on our program 'Instructions to social service chairmen', said Miss Marion Curtiss of the department. 'Briefly, the problems to be considered are:

"I.—The health of the community—(a) birth registration; (b) tuberculosis; (c) city planning; (d) housing; (e) garbage; (f) water supply; (g) milk and food.

"II.—Recreation.

"III.—Treatment of juveniles, both dependent and delinquent.

"IV.—Care of community poor.

"V.—Care of people in institutions of community.

"VI.—Mothers' pensions.

"It is important to develop public opinion throughout the state on these problems. Do this by propaganda, stimulating contributions and rallying volunteers to existing agencies and institutions. Public opinion should insist on adequate appropriations for city, county and state work, and the enforcement of social legislation."

BUSINESS MEN SEEK ROAD IMPROVEMENTS

The meeting of the New Trier Commercial association held at the Village Hall in Wilmette on December 11 had a fair attendance. A resolution was adopted and a committee appointed by the president to petition the County and Bridge commissioners of the County Board of Cook County to pave with concrete, Lake avenue from Ridge to Milwaukee avenue. This improvement would link two great highways, Sheridan road and Milwaukee avenues. It would open up the markets of the north shore for all the products of the rich farming districts as far west as Wheeling, Illinois. The Truck Farmers and Gardeners' association and The Milk Producers association have been invited to co-operate with the New Trier Commercial association in the endeavor to accomplish this much needed improvement.

The regular order of business was transacted. All members present were requested by the president to urge all members of the association and all men interested in professional and commercial occupations to attend the next regular meeting which will be held Wednesday, evening, January 8, 1919 at Community House, Winnetka.

LIEUT. LOUIS BRUCH MISSING IN ACTION

Lieutenant Louis Bruch Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis Bruch of 1201 Greenwood avenue, was reported missing in action on November 10, in a dispatch received by the family late last week from the War department.

Lieutenant Bruch was an aviator attached to the 91st Aviation squadron. He was last seen flying over the enemy's lines on the day prior to the signing of the armistice.
