This hospital is said to be one of the largest reconstruction hospitals in the country, being equipped with approximately five thousand beds. The old barracks have been remodeled and fitted up with accessories, and the work on the new buildings is rapidly progressing. The Administration building when completed will afford accommodations for the staff and it is here that the "Hospital Mother" will have her headquarters, the furnishings for which have been donated by the Kansas W. C. T. U.
