



Social Happenings on the North Shore by Ruth Risley

ONE of the largest and most enthusiastic meetings of the Federation of Woman's clubs of the Tenth Congressional district of Illinois, of which Mrs. Martin Kent Northam, of Evanston, is president, was held Monday at the Edgewater Beach hotel. The luncheon attendance exceeded that of any previous meeting, numbering over six hundred members from the various clubs in the federation. The largest luncheon attendance before Monday's meeting was five hundred members. The afternoon session was even more largely attended than the morning, the total number of guests being approximately seven hundred.

The morning session opened with a board meeting at 9:30 o'clock and a business meeting at 10:30. The address of welcome was made by the president of the Hostess club, Mrs. John Edward Cooke. This was followed by brief reports from the presidents of clubs which have been invited to join the federation since its last meeting in the fall. The new clubs are the L. O. L. Woman's club, Eugene Field Parents' and Teachers' association, Woman's club of Libertyville, Hayt School Parents' and Teachers' association, Hamlin Park Woman's club, Brownson circle, Birchwood Morning Musical, Lake Shore Woman's club, North Shore Woman's club, Twenty-sixth Ward Civic League of Chicago and the Chicago Library club. Luncheon was served at 12:30 o'clock and the afternoon session opened with the "Star Spangled Banner," the Birchwood Morning Musical leading, after which the same organization presented a group of vocal numbers. Arnold, whose subject was "World Co-operation," and Miss Grace Packard, whose address was on "Women and Reconstruction." Musical numbers were given by Mabel Hunter Field Camp.

North Shore clubs were well represented, quite a number of members attending as well as the president and two delegates from each club.
