WORLD PEACE PLANS UP FOR DISCUSSION

S. J. Duncan-Clark, War Analyst, to Tell Sunday Club Audience of Peace Conference Activities

VISITED BATTLE FRONTS

Has First Hand Knowledge of Conditions in Europe; Topic, "Problems of the Peace Conference"

Will the peace conference at Paris result in a league of nations?

Will the Monroe Doctrine be a help or a hindrance in the settlement?

Shall the great nations go on building their huge armaments?

Can the crowded nations with small territories find a breathing space without encroaching on other countries?

Discuss Peace Congress

These and many other similar questions will be discussed Sunday evening at the joint service of the Wilmette Sunday Evening club and the Wilmette Church union. The speaker will be S. J. Duncan-Clark, war analyst of the Chicago Evening Post whose subject will be "Problems of the Peace Conference."

Perhaps there has been no greater success among publicists of the day than that achieved by Mr. Duncan-Clark during the war period. Even before he was invited to France as a guest of the British government to see at first hand what was happening at the front lines he had made an enviable reputation with his war commentaries. Since his return he has followed as closely the diplomatic negotiations and the developments at the peace conference. His address which is up to the minute on current events may be expected to be illuminating.

Plan Proves Successful

The services will be in accordance with the plan of the committee in charge of the Sunday programs to interpret world events of vital significance from the moral and religious view points.

CARS TO STOP AT LAKE AND CENTRAL AVENUES

Express and local trains on the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railway will again make stops, to receive and discharge passengers, at Central and Lake avenues, Wilmette.

Representatives of the electric road appeared before the Village Board Tuesday evening at which time a compromise was effected by which local and express trains will make the additional stops in the Village and limited trains make only the stops at Linden and Wilmette avenues.

A general protest came as the result of the elimination of Central avenue as a local stop several months ago when the United States Fuel Administration ordered the skip-stop system adopted in the Village. The new order becomes effective immediately.

BROTHER AND SISTER DIE WITHIN 3 WEEKS

The death of Waldo B. Cronk at Toronto, Canada, on Monday, January 27, marks the passing of two members in one family within a period of 3 weeks. Mr. Cronk was the brother of Mrs. O. W. Russell, formerly of 1009 Elmwood avenue, who died on January 6.

Mr. Cronk was well known in Chicago and on the north shore. He was Vice-president of the Carquet, Gulf Shore and Kent Northern Railways of Canada at the time of his death.

Mr. Cronk had been in the railroad business all his life. He was born in Footville, Wisconsin. His first position was with the Chicago and Northwestern railway. As promotion offered he joined at intervals the staffs of the St. Paul, Minneapolis and Omaha road, The Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific, Baltimore and Ohio, Canadian Pacific, Grand Trunk Pacific and National Transcontinental.

Mr. Cronk's mother, Mrs. A. E. Cronk, has been staying in Wilmette since the death of her daughter, Mrs. O. W. Russell. He is survived also by his widow and 3 sons. The eldest, Charles C. Cronk, is a highway engineer in the employ of the Saskatchewan Provincial government; E. P. Cronk of Toronto is with the Canadian National railways, and the youngest, Harold W. Cronk, is a student at Cornell University.

MRS. HANNAH A. PECK BURIED AT WAUKEGAN

Mrs. Hannah A. Peck, widow of Daniel P. Peck, mother of Blanche Peck Wanner of Wilmette and Ashley P. Peck of Evanston, after an illness of 4 years, passed away on Saturday, February 1, at the home of her daughter, 629 Central avenue.

Cleanliness Next to Godliness

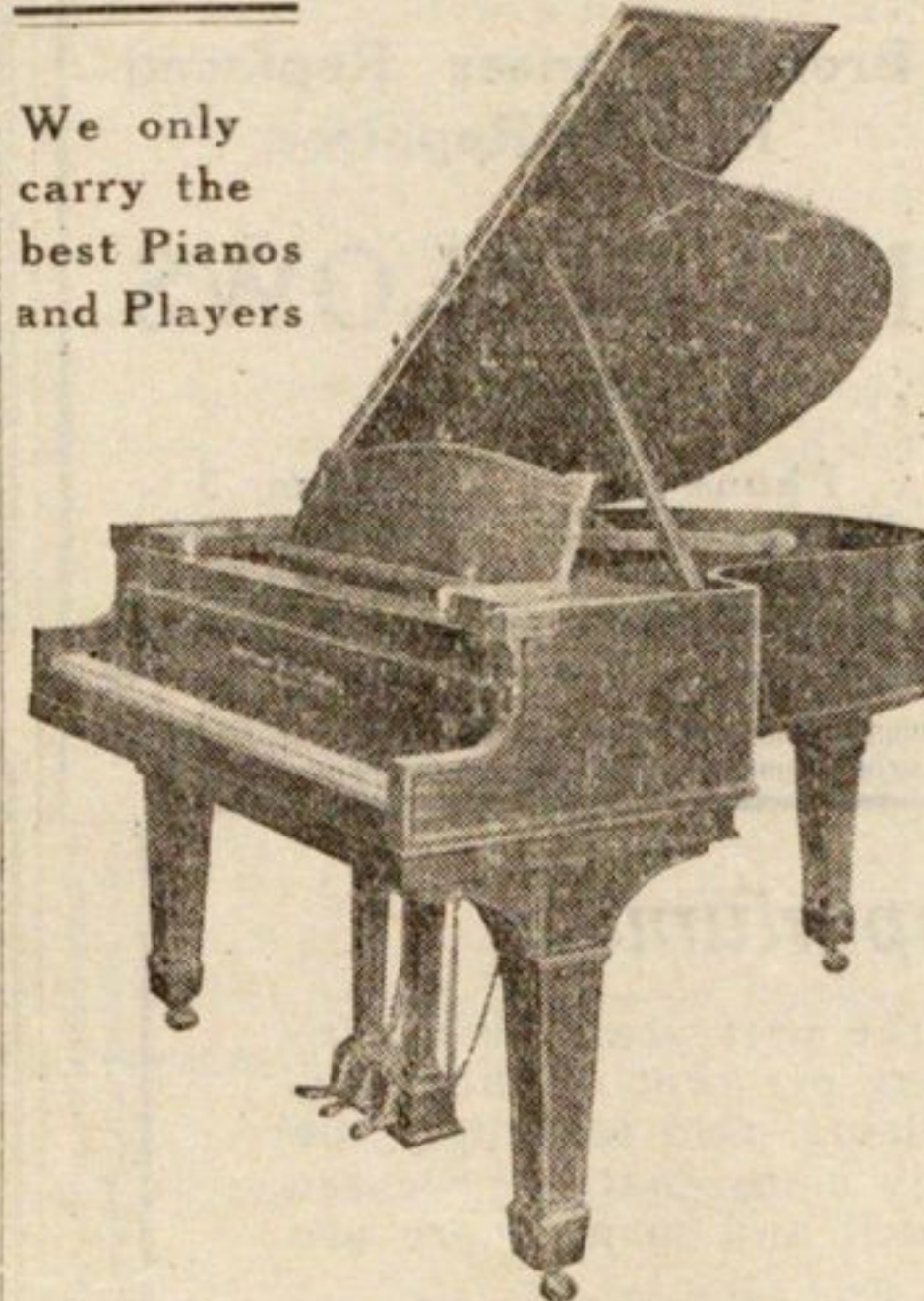

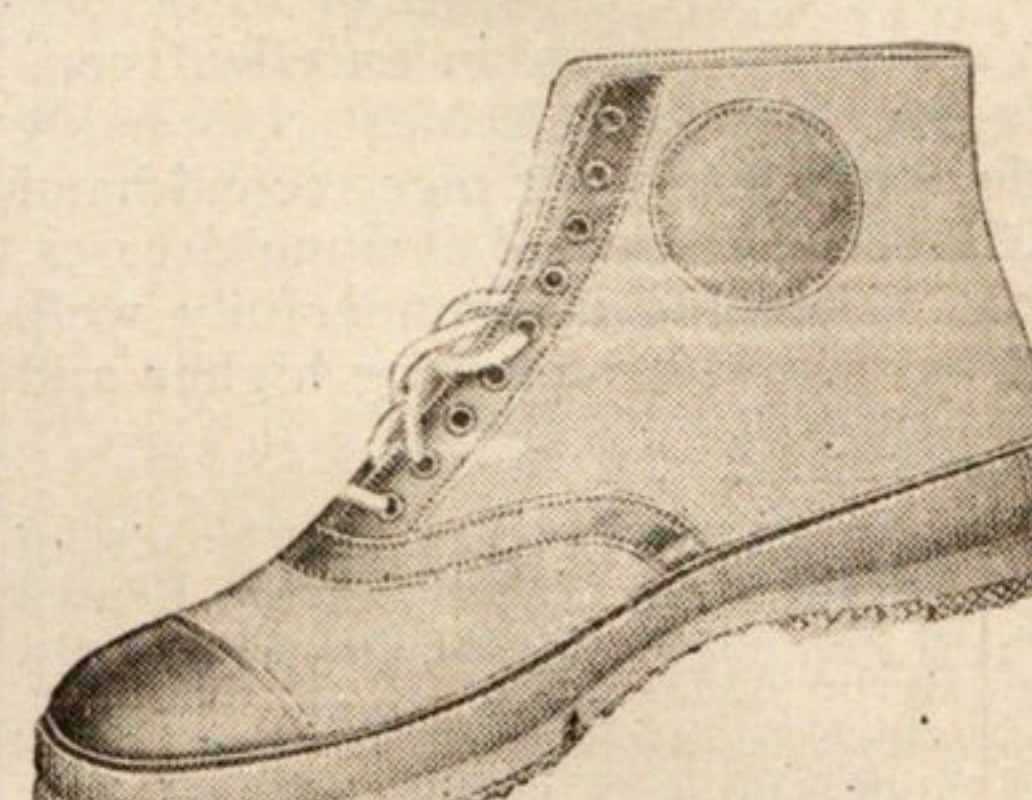
