No one is undertaking a more varied and interesting trip to foreign parts than Mrs. Lorenzo Johnson of Winnetka, who sets forth in a few days, in company with her son and his wife, for Venezuela, where Mr. Johnson, as charge d'affaires, will be in actual charge of the American legation during the absence of our minister there. It's a long and by no means easy journey to Caracas, the Venezuelan capital.

Mrs. Johnson expects to be back again by June in her attractive house, "Lasolas," on the bluffs of Winnetka.

When this country went into the war Mrs. Johnson made it possible for each of her three sons-in-law to go to his country's service by promising to look after the wife and family of each if they needed it. George Massey and Ayres Boal went into the navy while Captain Hardenberg returned to the army, which he had left some years before to go into business.

Ayers Boal, who has been in command of a destroyer, is coming home in a day or so, while George Massey returned a week ago, after fifteen months of the hardest kind of service on the North sea, first as a mine layer and then as mine sweeper.

Captain Hardenberg is now a colonel and is still in service, though he is planning to return to civil life. The Hardenbergs, who have been camping out in a Winnetka apartment, will shortly move into their own house in Hubbard Woods. The Ayers Boals are in their own cozy brown house on Sheridan road, while nearby, in a quaint cottage on Mrs. Johnson's place, the George Masseys are enjoying the fruits of peace.
