

Wilmette Toy Maker to Exhibit Products at All-American Exposition in Chicago.

Miss Hannah Wiederanders of 1507 Highland avenue, has been asked to exhibit her toys at the booth of the All-American Exposition which will be held at the Coliseum June 7 to 22. Miss Wiederander's pigs and chickens, which are well known in Wilmette, and are beginning to be well known all over the country, are to be placed in the exhibit of artistic toys which will be one of the many artcraft exhibits at the exposition.

One of the ideas of the All-American Exposition is to encourage the manufacture of articles in America, which have formerly been made abroad, and also to encourage the citizens of foreign birth and blood who are acquainted with the manufacture of these articles to make use of their knowledge. Toy making is one of the most important of these industries, especially the toys which have a real art value such as those made in Miss Wiederanders' basement toy shop here in Wilmette.

Big Art Exhibit

The All-American Exposition has been planned by a group of men and women prominent in art, civic and industrial interests in and about Chicago, as a means to a better understanding between native and foreign born Americans. To this end arts and crafts of all kinds which have been and are being manufactured in this country by foreign born citizens will be exhibited at the Coliseum. Fabrics, toys, embroideries, basketry and laces are but a few of the many subjects which are to be shown.

There is not to be a segregation of each nationality, but a segregation of subject, to which are brought the products of all the nationalities. Choice rugs of the far east will hang side by side with the work of the Navajo and the Mexican Indian. Lace of Belgian, French and Irish design will lie side by side with Hawaiian work, while old Chinese embroideries will vie with the intricate needlework of Madeira.

Some Rare Collections

Exhibits will not be restricted to articles actually made in this country. Rare old pieces will be brought out and shown as examples of the work which might be carried on here and which is being done in a simpler way.

The Exposition, however, will not

be all exhibits. There will be a great many amusements, side shows and ballyhoos of the good old fashioned carnival type. Cafes will be presided over by experts in foreign cooking, and cabarets and dancing will not be the least of the attractions.

The sale of tickets is already opened. Major General Leonard Wood purchased the first book of tickets last week, and women's organizations in all parts of the city and suburbs are campaigning to dispose of several hundred thousand at the pre-opening price of twenty-five cents. 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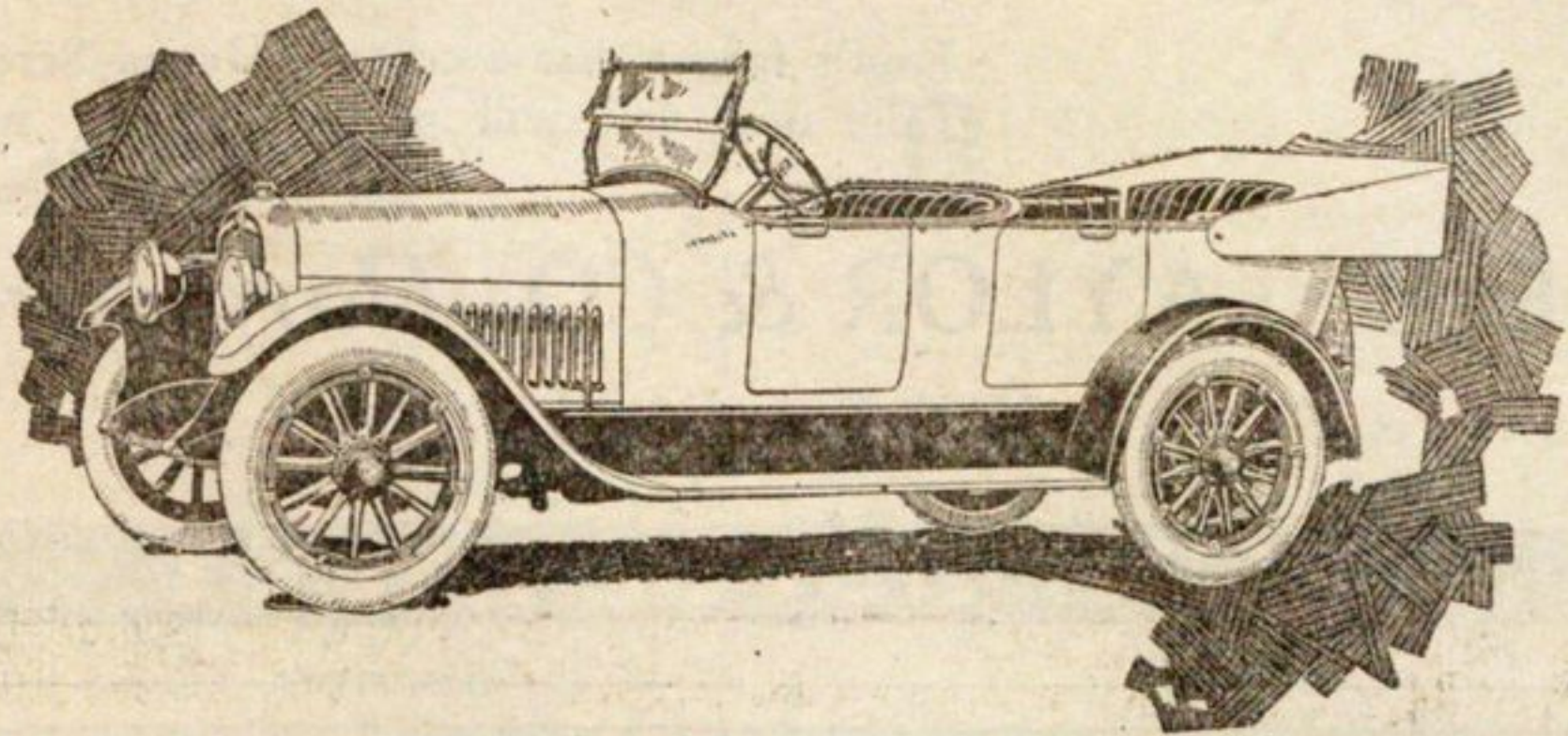
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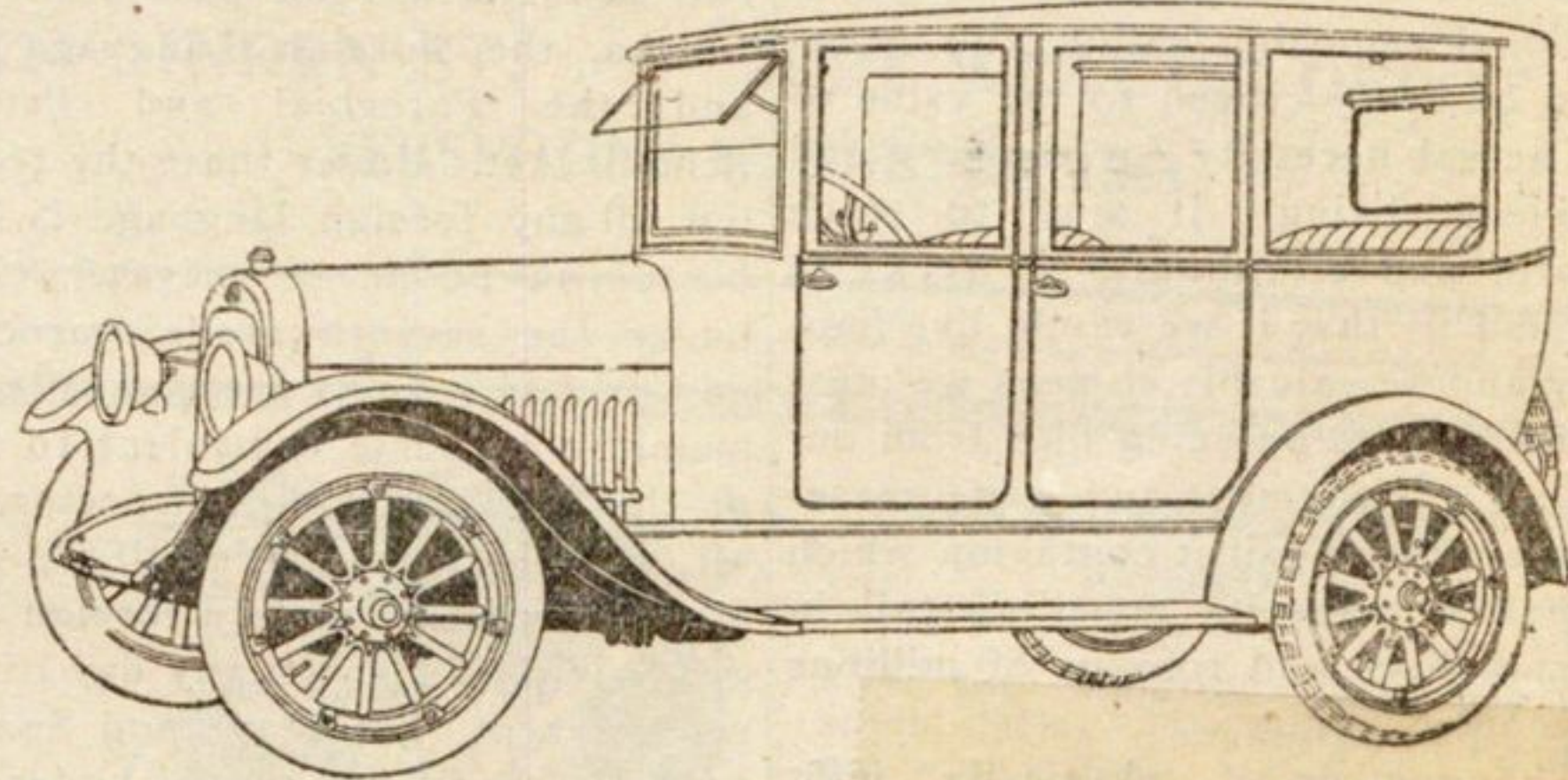
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
