The golf course will be open for play on May 3. The work on the pump house has been delayed but as soon as the water is turned on luncheon will be served in the grill room. Dinners will not be served at the club until all the dining room furniture and special serving equip-

ment has arrived.

Starting May 3 a motor bus will be in service from 8 a. m. to 9 p. m. daily. Until the new pavement in Dempster street is completed the bus will leave from the Northwestern Davis street station. The contract for bus and taxi service is with Edward R. Witt, who has made special rates for taxi service. There will be eight round trips daily from the Davis street station to the club. When the new road is completed the bus will start from Dempster street and will make ten round trips daily. Special trips will be arranged for the evening activities.






