

NEW TRIER SENIORS OFFER ANNUAL PLAY

"The Admirable Crichton," Is Chosen As Vehicle for Annual Event of School Spring Session

AN AMBITIOUS EFFORT
Entertainment Is Again Presented Under Direction of the High School Dramatic Club

On Saturday evening at 8 o'clock, in the school assembly hall, the Dramatic club of New Trier High school will present the annual Senior play. The play chosen this year is rather an ambitious one both from the standpoint of stage management and from that of dramatic ability. "The Admirable Crichton" by Sir James M. Barrie, is a clever and amusing play, rich in unusual situations and startling contrasts.

Lord Loam, whose democratic ideas are the despair of his friends and family, insists once a month on a servant's tea at which his servants are treated as his equals. His butler, Crichton, a perfect servant, finds this tea a great trial as his delight is in "a haughty, aristocratic English family with everyone kept in his place."

When Lord Loam's yacht is wrecked and he, his daughters and their guests are at loss to know how they can subsist on a desert island, Crichton comes into his own, and quickly proves himself resourceful and masterful. The castaways live for two years on the island, and during all that time Crichton maintains the superiority he achieved at the time of the wreck.

When, at last, the party is rescued and returns to England, Crichton renounces his position of authority, and slips back into that of the perfect servant.

Young people will be young people, and a certain amount of love making has been going on on the island, which in England would have been impossible. The romantic adventures of the castaways would startle their English friends, so a mutual agreement to maintain strict secrecy is entered upon. The possibility of disclosures kept the whole group in disagreeable suspense until finally the conspiracy of silence has carried the conspirators safely through their last ordeal.

DEMPSTER ROAD TO BE PAVED TO NEW GOLF CLUB

Preparations are now under way for the construction of the Dempster street road which connects Evanston and the new Evanston Golf club. The part of the road nearest the club will be commenced first and the club road will be completed in two weeks' time, after which the road is to be closed for a short time to allow the concrete to set properly.

The golf course will be open for play on May 3. The work on the pump house has been delayed but as soon as the water is turned on luncheon will be served in the grill room. Dinners will not be served at the club until all the dining room furniture and special serving equipment has arrived.

Starting May 3 a motor bus will be in service from 8 a. m. to 9 p. m. daily. Until the new pavement in Dempster street is completed the bus will leave from the Northwestern Davis street station. The contract for bus and taxi service is with Edward R. Witt, who has made special rates for taxi service. There will be eight round trips daily from the Davis street station to the club. When the new road is completed the bus will start from Dempster street and will make ten round trips daily. Special trips will be arranged for the evening activities.

The professional, R. G. McDonald, will be at the club on and after May 3, to take care of the clubs, give instruction in playing and to supply the members with golf equipment needs.

Come on, let's finish the job! Sure, we'll finish the job!

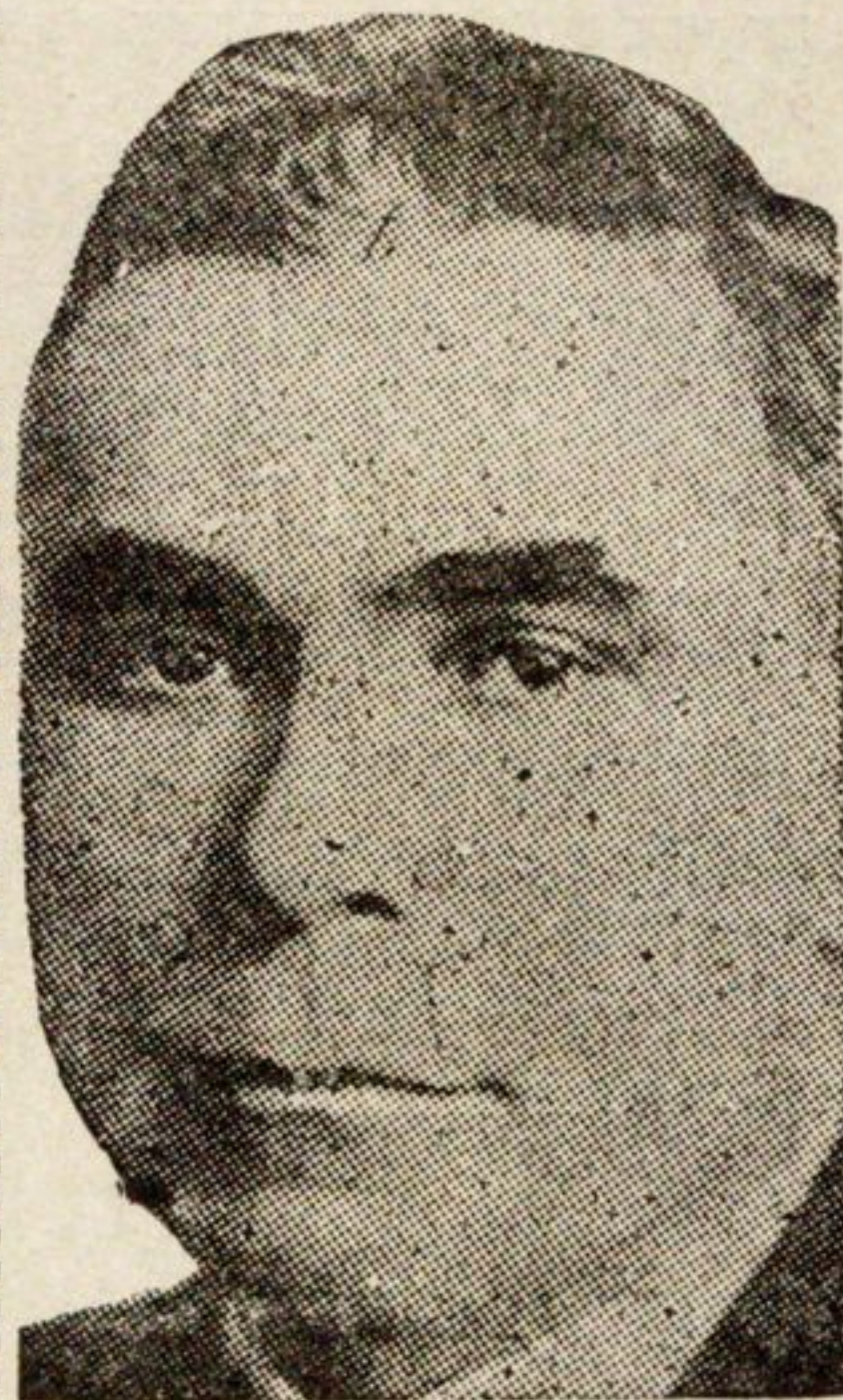
Every "V" is Heaven's message to each sweetheart, mother, wife,

BOYS' QUARTERS AT Y. M. C. A. TO BE MADE VERY MODERN

Plans for enlarging the quarters of the boys' department of the Evanston Y. M. C. A., where many north shore boys are members, were passed upon by the board of directors at a meeting last week. Frank Parker Davis, chairman of the boys' work committee, in speaking of the Boys' department said:

"The present quarters for the boys' department are a disgrace to Evanston. I am ashamed to show anyone the room that we use for the boys of the Y. M. C. A. We have at present over 600 members in the boys' department, which is the largest membership in proportion to the size of the city in the country. We have the poorest accommodations, from the

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standpoint of club privileges, for the games, reading room and general development of the boys' department." The stores now occupied by the Christian Science reading room and Raeder and Child's book store will be taken over by the Y. M. C. A. The boys' department has been quartered for a year in the store south of the Christian Science reading room. This move is a step in advance of the old plan of having the men and boys together in the main Y. M. C. A.

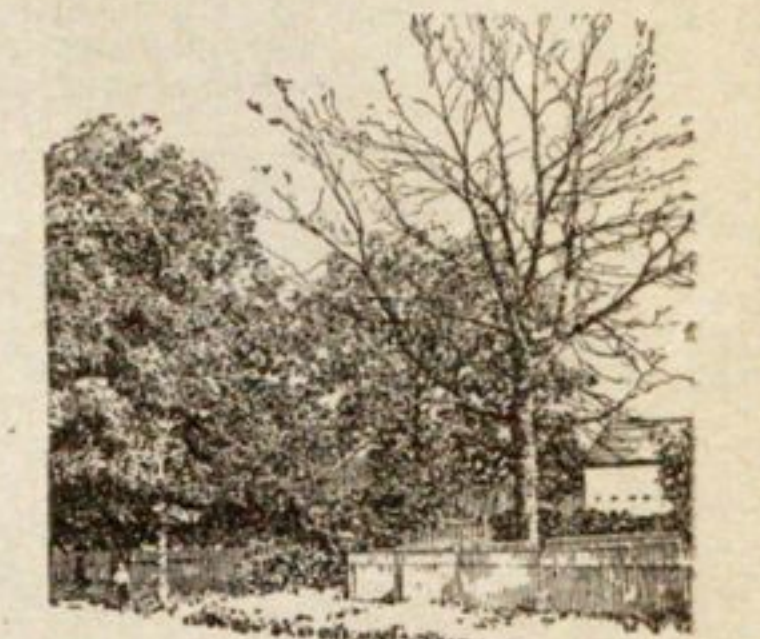
