## Bread Cast Upon The Waters

The United States has upon occasion proved itself to be a nation not entirely material in its nature. We have done generous things, cast our bread upon the waters in many instances, even before the outbreak of the great war. And another opportunity is presenting itself for a demonstration of the fact that we do not think altogether in terms of dollars and cents, but sometimes in terms of humanity as well.

It has been suggested by John J. Arnold, vice president of the First National Bank of Chicago, that the United States use the interest to be paid by the European countries upon their great war debt to us to help in the rehabilitation of those sections of Europe that suffered most from the war. Such a policy would, Mr. Arnold asserts, effectually destroy the idea of Europe that the United States is devoted only to the practice of a "dollar diplomacy," as has been so generally charged against us and so universally believed.

After the settlement of the Boxer uprising in China, this country, together with those other countries of Europe that assisted in the work, demanded and received from China a considerable indemnity. Later the United States with Quixotic diplomacy little understood by her associates in the affair, remitted to China the money that had been paid in indemnity. The effect upon China of that bit of justice and voluntary generosity has been quite conspicuously evident ever since, for China immediately set aside the fund to be used to send Chinese students to American colleges in order that American institutes and American customs may be learned and, so far as practicable, American policies may be introduced into the far eastern republic. The investment in the friendship and good will of China has been worth far more than it has cost us in the sacrifice of the money that we took because we happened to be in a position to demand it. Similarly the application of the interest upon the war debts of the European countries to us to the rebuilding of the devastated regions of Europe would be bread cast upon the waters, bound to return to us many fold.

7:35 o'clock—Spanish songs, west end of field.

7:50 o'clock—Rustic play in pavillion.

8:10 o'clock—Dance pageant; west end of field.

8:30 o'clock—Opening of the buildings; visitors welcome until 10 o'clock.

There will be a tent where experiments will be worked by the Chemistry classes. A wireless station in operation and a sale of toys, bird-sticks and bird-houses, made by the Manual Arts people. In case of inclement weather, the Fete will be postponed to the following Friday, June 13.

## CHURCH UNION PLANS ALL SUMMER SERVICES

Few, if any of the suburban communities have been as successful as has Wilmette in their plans for union or community church services. For several years the Wilmette Sunday Evening club has demonstrated the possibilities of getting a crowd for Sunday evening service. During the past winter the Baptist, Congregational, Methodist and Presbyterian churches have co-operated with the Sunday Evening club making more successful the effort for one worthwhile community service.

During the summer months these union meetings are to be continued under the auspices of the churches. The Reverend Hubert Carleton, rector of St. Augustine's Episcopal church, will be the speaker for next Sunday evening. The services will be held in the Presbyterian church, Ninth street and Greenleaf avenue, beginning at 8 o'clock.

Plans are being considered for open air services at some central place during July and August.

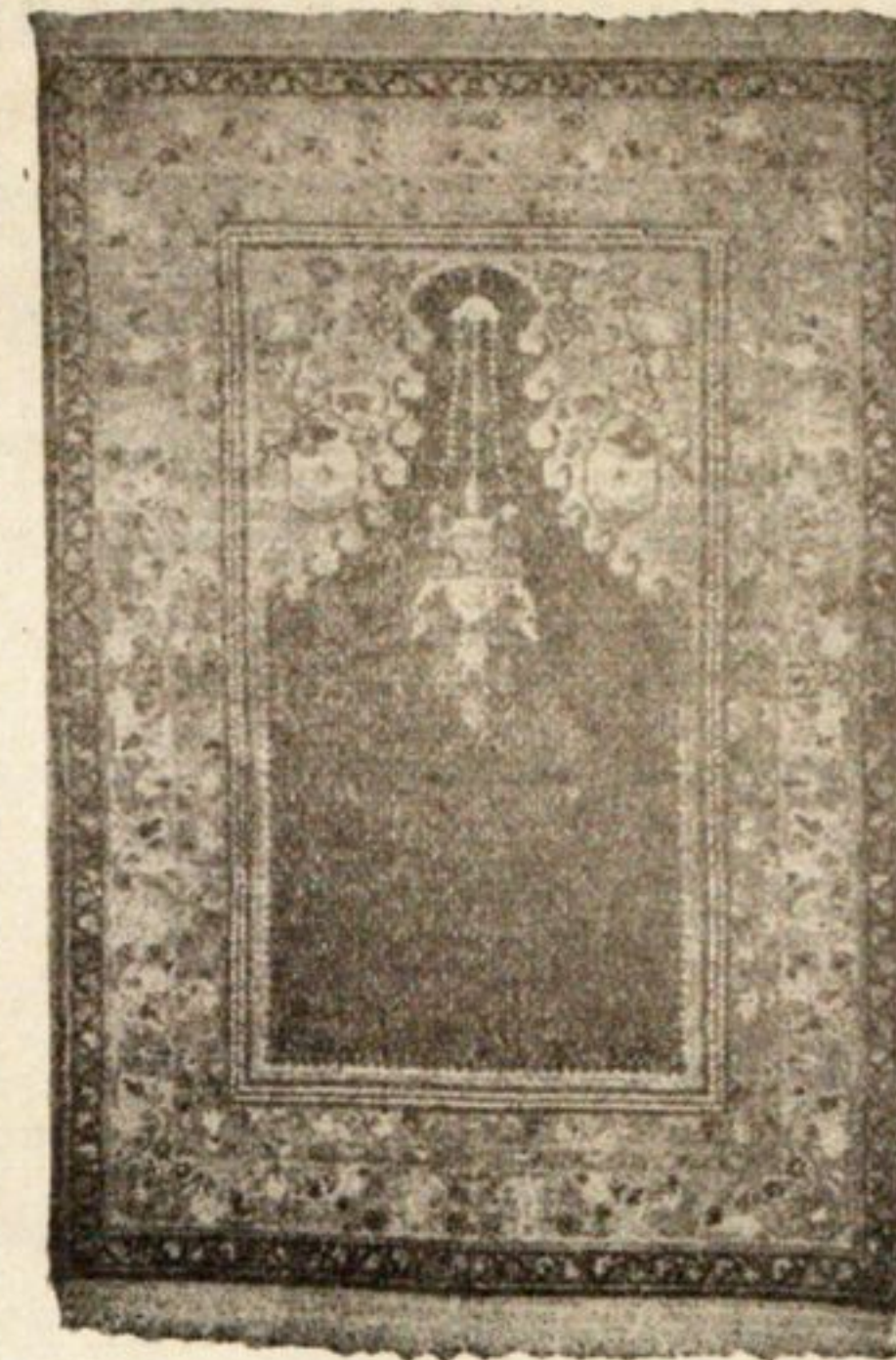
