

SUBSCRIBE \$21,000 TO CHURCH IN 20 MINUTES

Baptists Approve Plans For Proposed Church Edifice Here and Rally To Make Plans Reality

START WORK IN 3 MONTHS

Expect Completion of Building by next Spring; Hold Annual Dinner at Woman's Club

At a called meeting of the members of the Wilmette Baptist church held at the Wilmette Woman's club, Tuesday evening, June 17, following the annual dinner served by the women of the church, plans for construction of a church edifice were read and unanimously approved by the members who immediately substantiated their endorsement by subscribing \$21,000 as the initial fund to commence the work of construction. The money was subscribed within twenty minutes after the plans were approved.

The proposed church edifice is to be erected at the north-east corner of Wilmette and Forest avenues. The resolution of the Building committee of the church calls for completion, as soon as possible, of the church auditorium and the entire ground floor, although sentiment among the members was strongly in favor of the erection of the entire plant, without delay, which includes a modern Sunday school and Social work equipment on the north end of the lot.

Complete Modern Equipped
The building is to be of stone, the auditorium seating capacity being approximately 400. On the ground floor there is to be a spacious dining room and modern kitchen equipment arranged to accommodate either large or small social gatherings. Howard Bowen, a member of the church, is the architect.

Work on the building is expected to begin early in September and the structure opened for occupancy by next spring.

War Halted Building

The Baptist church, the youngest of Wilmette church organizations, had planned erection of a structure shortly before the outbreak of the war. The consequent ban on building operations throughout the country, only recently lifted, delayed the work many months.

During the war the congregation, which meets in the Wilmette Woman's club, was without the regular services of a pastor, with the Reverend Francis C. Stifler in the war service of the Y. M. C. A. The pastor has evidenced steady progress in beginning of the year and the church has been back at his post since the membership as well as financially. It is predicted the present building program will result in one of the most excellently equipped church buildings on the north shore.

He only struck out eleven men but how he did peeve the spectators from Winnetka! He took a long time in getting ready to wind up, an awful long time to wind up after getting ready but a very short time to send that pill o'er the plate. He had the Winnetkans baffled to such an extent with his slowness and big smile that at one time a fan bellowed out, "Come on and pitch, you are worse than an eight-day clock in winding up."

Wilmette took the heart out of their opponents in the first and second innings. In the first they scored four runs before a man was retired. In the second three more crossed the home plate for runs and then the game steadied down. After getting one run in the first Winnetka waited until the fifth to get their second and last marker. Wilmette pounded four more in the eighth and the Winnetkans gave up.

Errors lost the game for Winnetka. Anderson who played first base during the first two innings couldn't hang on to the pill and his errors put Woods, the pitcher, in a hole. In the second inning the errors were repeated. In fact Wilmette made only three hits to score their first seven runs.

Eight errors were chalked up against the Winnetkans while Wilmette made no mistakes. Eber starred in left field and Braun at first. Woods

started for Winnetka striking out six men. In batting Kreger led the team with three hits. Blow came next with a two-bagger, single and sacrifice hit.

ED BRAUN TOPPLES HLAVACEK; CLAIMS NORTH SHORE TITLE

Ed Braun, 629 Prairie avenue, earned the name of "Wild Cat Eddie" Tuesday night at the Forester hall, Gross Point, when he defeated "Vic" Hlavacek of Gross Point in a wrestling match in two straight falls. Braun now claims the wrestling title of Wilmette and Gross Point in the middleweight class.

The first fall came after 40 minutes of wrestling during which time Braun generally was on the offensive. He clamped the "Strangler Lewis" hold for the fall. The second fall was but a repetition of the first. Braun was out of danger at all times. He broke the holds Hlavacek clamped on him with apparent ease. After 34 minutes Hlavacek took the count for the second time when Braun used the "Half Nelson" and "Strangler Lewis" holds successfully.

It was plainly a match of skill and speed against strength, and "strength" lost. Hlavacek depended on the head-lock and toe-hold while Braun's chief weapon was the "Strangler Lewis" hold which he used so much that his opponent's head and shoulders ached considerably during the entire match.

Braun owes most of his success to his trainer, Fred Monty, of Kenilworth, who received his training from Charles Postle, one of the best wrestlers in Chicago. He not only trained Braun for this match but will continue to train him for another bout to be held in July.

The side attractions Tuesday consisted of a 3-round boxing match between Elmer Leis and Anthony Montenegro, the latter winning by a shade. After the first fall of the big match these same two gladiators came together in a wrestling match to be decided in one fall. Montenegro winning with a "Half-Nelson," the fact that he was not downed
