It is of interest to all of us these days to note what is being done for the soldiers at Fort Sheridan. Did you know that at the south end of the well wooded grounds of Ravinia Park, a group of women from nearby villages, has established a Red Cross rest camp for the convalescent soldiers at the military hospital? There is a most cozily furnished reading room and lounge, a well screened dining room, a completely equipped kitchen, all under canvass, and there daily, from fifteen to thirty wounded men are entertained.

The women provide the motors to take their guests to and from the hospital, and give them an excellent and generous midday meal. They have provided cots and wheel chairs for the more seriously injured, and they give all books, papers, writing materials, games and cigars.

An attractive rustic garden adorns the space in front of the main tent, and thick red cords rope off the whole enclosure, insuring to the men that privacy which is so precious both

to invalids and well people.

The semi-finals in the Aberdeen Cup will be played on Saturday, July 12. There will also be a Victory Cup event on that day.

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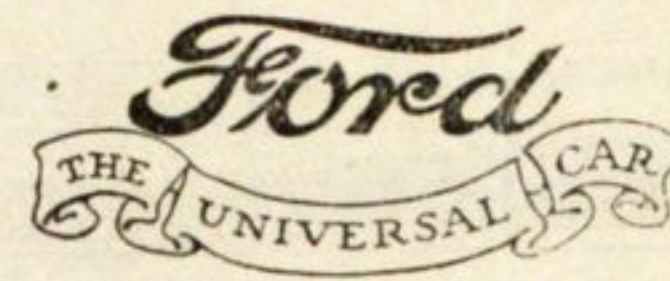
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
