

## HOUGH SPEAKS ON DANGER OF NERVES

London.—"Since the armistice the world has been one big union of mutinous nerves," said President Hough of Northwestern University, speaking at the Mansion house at a reception in his honor.

Dr. Hough said: "The first danger is that we may allow this period of world-wide weariness to become a period of world-wide misanthropy. There are difficulties connected with the situation in itself, but the most dangerous thing is not the situation, but the way we feel about it."

"We are confronted by a state of mind which is a good deal more dangerous than the actual state of the world."

"If the Christian mind settles down into heavy misanthropy the danger is that it will create the thing it fears. It is the first splendid opportunity of the church to refuse to be misled by this misanthropy."

"The second danger is another aspect of the first. It is that we may allow a world-wide nervous reaction to become a world-wide ethical reaction. We are all on edge nervously, but we do not like to admit that, except collectively."

"During the war, fathers and mothers at home and the boys at the front did not realize that all the while their nerves were being held tense—and that after the armistice was signed their nerves went on strike, joined a big union of mutinous nerves."

"That nervous reaction had to come. One of the greatest assets of the Christian religion is a sense of humor. If we were to refuse to take our nerves seriously we should perhaps learn what keeps the God Almighty steady, for we read that even He who sits in the heavens laughs."

### PORTABLE HOME SOLVES ALL OF MODERN PROBLEMS

No longer is the problem of the carpenters' strike, the problem of the modern labor situation or the problem of finding a house or an apartment in an overcrowded city unsolved. In Winnetka, on Hawthorne lane, a Winnetka man and his wife have found a way to overcome all of the difficulties that have been worrying people in Evanston and all the north shore towns. The servant problem is also solved, incidentally.

A new house is being erected, without the help of a single professional workman with the exception of a plumber. This little home was purchased just a few weeks ago of Sears-Roebuck company, Chicago, and it is of the portable variety. It is being erected with the help of one of the neighbors, who has volunteered his assistance. The house is of frame sections, and is being built on a foundation of twenty-six concrete pillars. There are just three rooms in the house, bathroom, living room and kitchen, and a nice little porch which will be used as the sleeping apartment. The entire home being only 29 by 18 feet, will dispose of the servant question completely. The heating plant will consist of a base-burner stove.

"We are going to paint the house green," says the owner, "and we will

trim it with white. Then we are going to make little terraces all around it and put in flowers and shrubbery. Later we expect to build a home when labor conditions settle down, but we had to have a place to live, so we decided on the portable house for the time being."
