"The annual meeting of the Highway Commissioners Good Roads association was held in the county board rooms, Chicago, on Wednesday -afternoon, September 24, at o'clock.

"This association was organized for the purpose of bringing about better co-operation between highway commissioners, county, city and state officials who have to do with the con- The more progressive farmers of this struction and maintenance of hardsurfaced highways and the care of all bridges and the lateral roads of Cook county.

"William G. Edens, president of the Associated Roads organization, addressed the meeting and told of the present situation in Cook County with respect to future road building plans.

"The following resolutions were unanimously adopted in support of the \$5,000,000 Cook County bond assue:

"Whereas, under the plan adopted by Illinois to assure the immediate use of \$12,000,000 federal aid money on the highways of this state, there will be no funds available until 1921 for the continuation of a comprehensive plan of development on the roads of Cook county; and

"Whereas, the public has observed the important commercial and social benefits resulting from previous bond issues of \$3,000,000 spent on permanent good roads; therefore be it

"Resolved, by the Highway Commissioners Good Roads association, assembled in meeting on September 24, 1919, that we hereby endorse a plan for the issuance of \$5,000,000 county good roads bonds to be voted on at the election next November, the money from said bonds to carry through a construction program of approximately two years, at the end of which time the \$60,000,000 state bond issue will be available to continue the work.

"It was ordered upon motion that a copy of these resolutions be sent to all members of the county board, township highway commissioners, village presidents and clerks, and to all of the newspapers published in Cook county. It is respectfully urged that all of these parties should bring this matter to the attention of the voters beween now and election on November 4, so that the issue may be fully understood."


DRY SOILS AND SOILS THAT BLOW
