

## Armistice Day to Be Climax of Red Cross Roll Call Starting Nov. 2

Armistice Day, November 11, is a fitting climax for the Red Cross Roll Call which opens on November 2 and closes on the anniversary of the ending of the greatest war of all time.

A half million members and \$1,200,000 in subscriptions is the goal set by the Chicago chapter in its Roll Call and Third War Fund drive. This campaign is no less urgent than that of June, 1918, when the \$6,000,000 asked for re-construction work at home and overseas was over-subscribed by more than \$700,000. While the end of Red Cross ministrations overseas is in sight, obligations here at home to the men who served in the war and to their families still remain.

A year ago, on October 31, 1918, the Chicago chapter had 30 branches with 152 auxiliaries in Cook and Lake counties. While activities among the majority of these groups ceased shortly after the armistice, the machinery remains intact and can be re-mobilized whenever an urgent need arises.

At last accounting the chapter membership was 501,604. Campaign officials believe that every member will again pledge his or her support to "see the job through" of assisting men who have served their country to resume placed in civilian life. Registration places will open on November 2 in each locality where enrollment in the Third annual Roll Call may be effected.

Calls for assistance are now received at the rate of 10 every hour by the Home Service department, in Chicago, from returning men or from the families of those still in service. For the past three months an average of 22,000 families have been in the care of the department. The help extended, often in the form of a gift or a loan, is not charity but due recognition for the service rendered by our men in the war.

A detailed story of one week's work, recently, revealed 17,308 instances of service. During that time 1,324 men were aided with insurance

## Advise Soldiers of War Risk Insurance Pledges

The Bureau of War Risk Insurance wishes to emphasize the importance to service men of the provisions of the War Risk Insurance Act upon the fulfillment of which may depend the validity of their claim to compensation under the Act.

The War Risk Insurance Act provides that "No Compensation shall be payable for death or disability which does not occur prior to or within one year after discharge or resignation from the service, except that where, after a medical examination made pursuant to regulations, at the time of discharge or resignation from the service, or within such reasonable time thereafter, not exceeding one year, as may be allowed by regulations, a certificate has been obtained from the director to the effect that the injured person at the time of his discharge or resignation was suffering from injury likely to result in death or disability."

Many discharged men are not familiar with or are inclined to disregard this provision of law and are allowing their rights thereunder to lapse.

Request for the certificate mentioned above should be made to the Chief Medical Advisor, Bureau of War Risk Insurance, Washington, D. C.

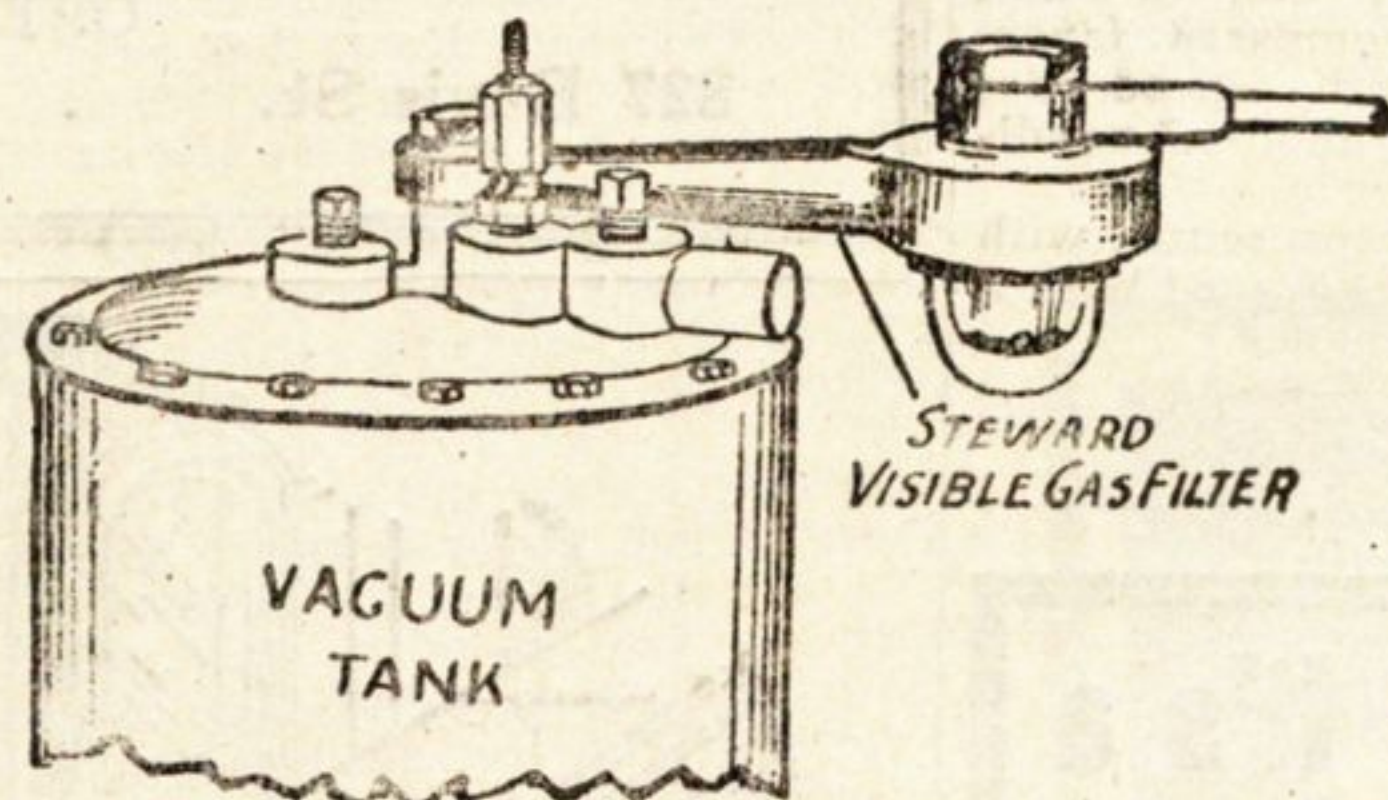

problems; 2,013 with compensation problems; 1,944 with allotment and allowance difficulties; 1,029 with financial assistance and 1,468 were given employment and vocational advice. Hundreds of others were aided in securing bonuses, locating bonds, straightening out of financial difficulties and in the correction of discrepancies in pay and discharge papers.

Chicago and the north shore has extended a welcoming hand to more than 1,074,149 passing troops during the past year through its canteen service. Some idea of the magnitude of this work is shown in the following facts: Meals served at the canteen in Grant Park total 112,748; 8,183,220 cigarettes have been distributed while 336,290 cups of coffee and 383,290 doughnuts have been served at various hours of the day and night.

Future plans already formulated by the Chicago chapter embrace a re-organization of the four Base Hospitals, Eleven, Twelve, Thirteen and Fourteen, whose war record overseas reflected great credit upon Chicago. They will be equipped to function in all emergencies so that any need arising from flood, fire, epidemic or other cause may be instantly met. Extension of the Home Nursing courses, already available to the women of the city and suburbs, is to be arranged on a greatly increased scale.

#### SPECIAL ASSESSMENT NOTICE

In the Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, General Number 347,511

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the Village of Winnetka, Cook County, Illinois, having ordered a supplemental special assessment to pay the estimated deficiency in the cost of the work and interest for the construction of a local improvement in the Village of Winnetka, County of Cook and State of Illinois, the ordinance for which said improvement provided for the improvement of Hill Road from the present pavement at the west line extended of Ridge Avenue, southwesterly to a line running at right angles to the center line of said Hill Road at a point 16.25 feet north-easterly from the intersection of said center line of said Hill Road with the south line of Section twenty (20), Township Forty-two (42) North, Range Thirteen (13) East of the Third Principal Meridian, including all street returns as far back as the street lines of said Hill Road extended, by grading, including preparation of subgrade, digging side ditches and grading the parkways, draining, constructing Portland cement concrete base, constructing reinforced concrete culvert, constructing concrete end walls, curbing and paving with a bituminous macadam wearing surface on said concrete base an eighteen (18) foot roadway, all in the Village of Winnetka, County of Cook and State of Illinois, and which said ordinance was passed and approved by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Winnetka, Cook County, Illinois, on the eleventh day of September, A. D. 1917, and which special assessment proceeding was known as General Number 333,500, in the Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the Village Clerk of said Village, and the said village having applied to the Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, for a supplemental special assessment to pay the estimated deficiency in the cost of the work and interest of said local improvement, according to the benefits, and a supplemental special assessment therefor having been made and returned to said Court, General Number 347,511, the final hearing thereon will be held on the third day of November, A. D. 1919, or as soon thereafter as the business of the said Court will permit. All persons desiring may file objections in said Court before said day, and may appear on the hearing and make their defense. Said ordinance provides for the collection of said supplemental special assessment in five (5) annual installments with interest thereon at the rate of five per centum (5%) per annum.
