

Gives Good Ideas For Furnishings

Some ideas on furnishing a home were given at Northwestern University settlement in Chicago recently by Miss Stella Skinner of the university faculty. The suggestions are very practical and could be followed by north shore young couples to advantage if they could only find a vacant house or apartment to occupy.

"Costly rugs are not necessary," said Miss Skinner. "A hit or miss rag rug is often more attractive than one which has cost much money. Heavy furniture is undesirable for general use and also from the artistic point of view. Select lightweight pieces, but only a few at a time and buy judiciously."

"One can get along without a dining room better than he can go without any other room of the house. Instead of a sideboard you can have a built-in cabinet. Instead of a big, clumsy dining table why not use a folding table which can be set against the wall when the meal is finished? Then the room can be used as a living room."

Miss Skinner said that the rocking chair is the only American contribution to the world of furniture.

She continued about draperies: "They should be selected with the greatest of care," she explained. "Windows, which are there for light and air, should not be covered up with hangings which keep out the sun. One may have a pretty green which suggests the summer foliage or an autumn color of golden yellow. Strike a keynote and make everything harmonize with it. Draperies that have a play of colors, that is, two shades woven together, always are attractive."

On Tuesday, November 4, voters of the north shore will be asked to ballot for delegates for the Illinois Constitutional Convention. For the consideration of north shore voters are presented the names of Frederic R. De Young of Harvey, Ill., and Amos C. Miller, of Kenilworth. Two candidates are to be selected for the convention.

Mr. De Young was the floor leader in the State Assembly in the fight for the Constitutional Convention and has had wide experience in legislative circles. Mr. Miller has for years been prominent as an efficient corporation attorney.

ADOLPH E. ROULAND IS "CON CON" CANDIDATE

Wilmette Man Represents Demo-
cratic Party in Seventh District;
Would Fight Special Interests

The Democratic side of the Constitutional Convention delegate ballot on election day, Tuesday, November 4, will bear the name of Adolph E. Rouland, 1534 Highland avenue, as representing the Seventh district.

Mr. Rouland has been a resident of Wilmette for several years and is well known to most villagers. He formerly was active in village affairs in Maywood where he served one term as president of the board of education of School District number 89. He is president of the Rouland Publishing company of Chicago.

Mr. Rouland was born near Scottville, Illinois, thirty-eight years ago. He was a school teacher for several years and at one time principal of the Central school at Hillsboro, Illinois. He has been a resident of Cook county for twelve years. He is married and has two children.

As a candidate for the important Illinois Constitutional Convention Mr. Rouland is pledged to "stand for the rights of the people and against special privilege seeking corporations."

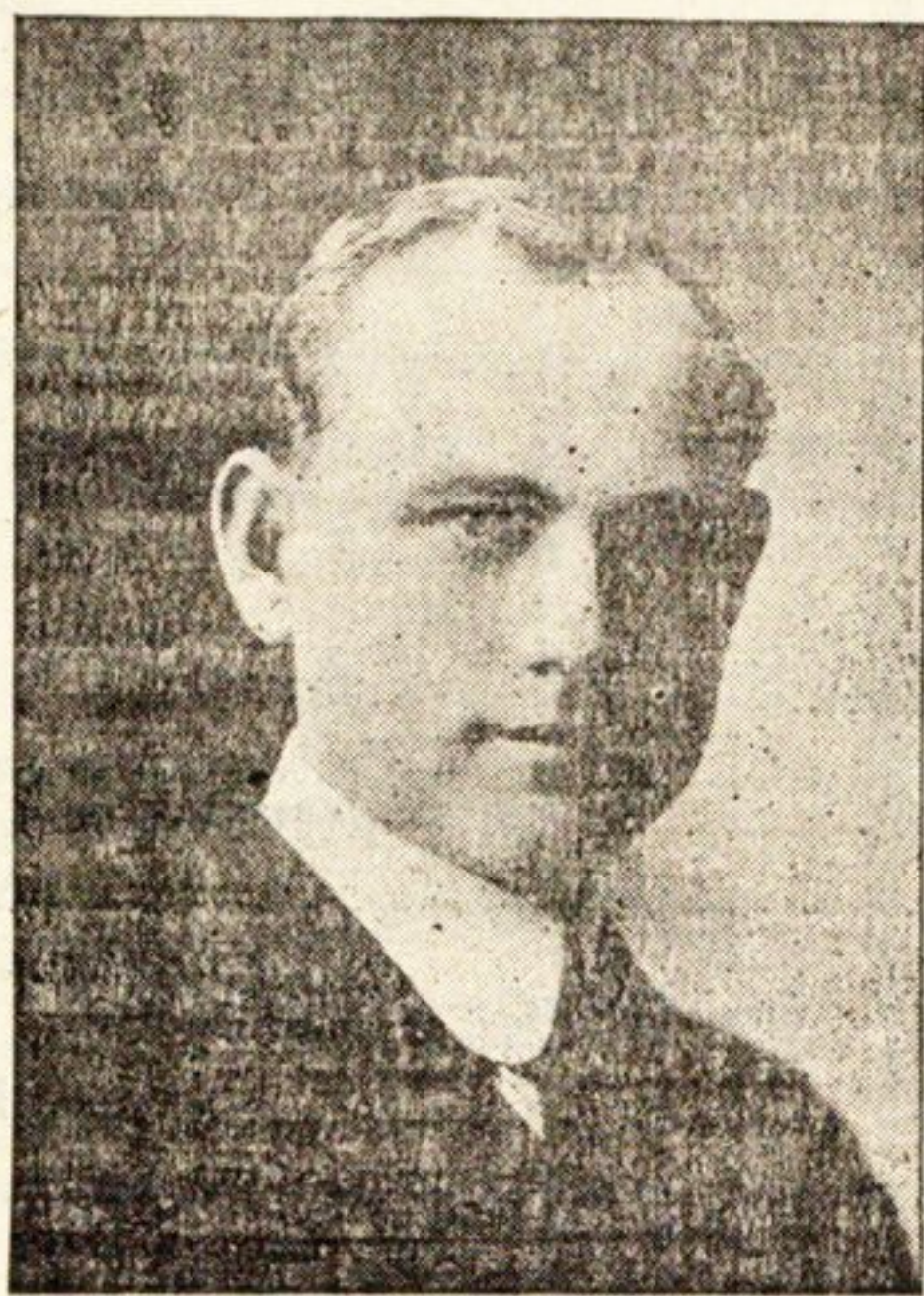
