Join The Red Cross

This week is registration week for the Red Cross. Each citizen is asked to enter his name as a member of the great relief organization that has played so important a part in the winning of the war.

Registration is to be optional and voluntary. No solicitation will be made. Each is asked to do his part to keep the Red Cross a great and effective body serving the people in their hour of need ever ready and watchful for the cry for help.

The vast emergency work furnished directly by the war is, happily, passed. Everybody hopes that such a demand will not again have to be met in this generation, at least, never, if the League of Nations is brought into being and serves the purpose that it is expected to serve. But there are other needs for the service of the Red Cross. There is still much indirect war work to be done. There are still those awful "acts of Providence," as they are listed in insurance policies, disasters against which there is no protection, blows that leave whole cities helpless, isolated perhaps, without any of the necessities to make life possible. These we

cannot prevent by any covenant. We can but be ready to meet them as adequately as may be in the very shortest possible time for preparation and getting under way with relief. The Red Cross offers the machinery for such ever present help. But its efficient functioning depends upon the support of the public and support comes solely from the membership in the organization.

A dollar put into the Red Cross membership fee is a dollar well spent for the good of humanity. The Red Cross button in the coat lapel tells the story of sympathy with the relief body and a willingness to do one's bit towards helping those who are, or may be, in distress.

The output of platinum, palladium, and other metals of the platinum group in Alaska in 1918 is estimated at 284 fine ounces, valued at \$36,600, according to the United States Geological Survey, Department of the Interior.

Platinum was recovered from the gold placers of some districts in larger amounts and from some in smaller amounts than last year.

One of the most interesting events of the year in connection with Alaska mining is the recovery of substantial amounts of palladium and of some platinum from the copper ore of the Salt Chuck mine, near Ketchikan.

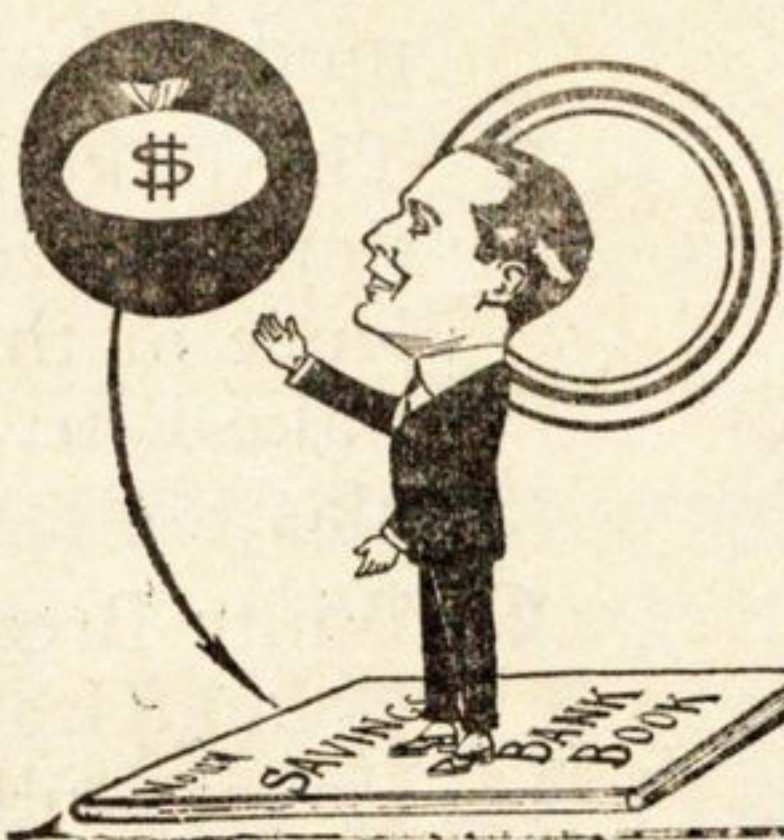

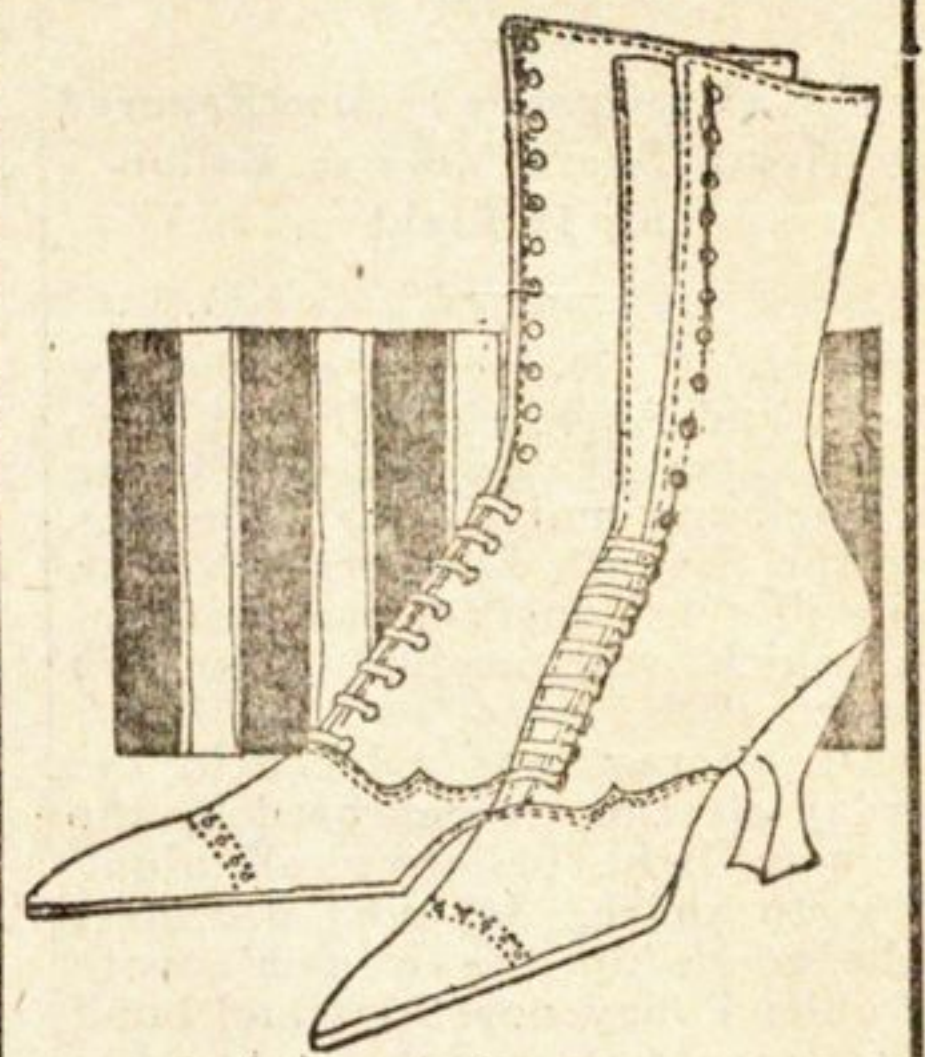
