of the discovery by American Army officers of the grave of Lieutenant Andrew Courtney Campbell, Jr. The information was cabled to the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Courtney Camobell, 149 Kenilworth avenue, Kenilworth.

Lieutenant Campbell was one of the first north shore fighters to sacrifice his life in the World War.

He was an aviator with a record of four enemy planes "downed" officially and double that number in addition, unofficially. He was killed in battle almost exactly two years ago, and since that time his father and mother have made every effort able them properly to take care of to find his last resting place.

barely finished reading your letter.

know how to express myself. The grave is in a direction quite opposite from the locality given us. The reason of our not finding it was ! that it is so closely covered with a twisted mass of barbed wire that it is not visible ten feet away and we might have passed within a few feet of it on our first search.

"Come very nice people have moved into a wooden hut in the village of Pargny and it was one of their small boys who helped Hamilton on his last search.

"The cross on the grave is clearly marked with Courtney's name and the date on which he fell, and it will be cared for."

Miss Vail added that under the French regulations Lieutenant Campbell's body would eventually be transferred to a French cemetery unless his parents would give permission

Word was received late last week for its immediate transference to the American military cemetery at Pleissy, on the Soissons road.

"We would prefer to have our boy lie where he fell," said Mr. Camphell, "but seeing that that is evidently impossible we have cabled our permission for his removal to the American cemetery."

"The prevention of contagious diseases is almost entirely a matter of ome hygiene, and the responsibility for the maintenance of civilian health must be borne in the immediate future more and more by the women in the home.

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not adequately prepared in the abence of professional care to safeguard their homes from contagion and to nurse their families in case of minor illnesses, as has been only too evident in the recent influenza epidemic, which had a casualty list of over 400,000 in the United States.

"The conservation of the health of our people, whether in time of war peace, is a national service as well as a home duty.

"To further universal education and protection," the Red Cross urges that every woman and girl in the country register for the course in! home nursing.
