

### Grave of Lieut. A. Courtney Campbell Jr. Located near Pargny by American Officers

Word was received late last week of the discovery by American Army officers of the grave of Lieutenant Andrew Courtney Campbell, Jr. The information was cabled to the parents, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Courtney Campbell, 149 Kenilworth avenue, Kenilworth.

Lieutenant Campbell was one of the first north shore fighters to sacrifice his life in the World War.

He was an aviator with a record of four enemy planes "downed" officially and double that number in addition, unofficially. He was killed in battle almost exactly two years ago, and since that time his father and mother have made every effort to find his last resting place.

Today Mr. and Mrs. Campbell received from Miss Anna Murray Vail, treasurer of the American Fund for French Wounded in Paris, a letter which said:

"It is now my great privilege to be able to tell you that Courtney's grave has been found and that he is buried close to the spot where his plane fell.

"Some ten days or perhaps a fortnight ago Lieut. Hamilton told me that he had up to that time been unable to find it, but that, as so many of the German indications of the localities of allied graves were wrong, he was going to make another search, which would be his last. He went up to Pargny a few days ago and came in with his news, as I had barely finished reading your letter. I am so glad for you that I scarcely know how to express myself.

The grave is in a direction quite opposite from the locality given us. The reason of our not finding it was that it is so closely covered with a twisted mass of barbed wire that it is not visible ten feet away and we might have passed within a few feet of it on our first search.

"Some very nice people have moved into a wooden hut in the village of Pargny, and it was one of their small boys who helped Hamilton on his last search.

The cross on the grave is clearly marked with Courtney's name and the date on which he fell, and it will be cared for."

Miss Vail added that under the French regulations Lieutenant Campbell's body would eventually be transferred to a French cemetery unless his parents would give permission

for its immediate transference to the American military cemetery at Pleisy, on the Soissons road.

"We would prefer to have our boy lie where he fell," said Mr. Campbell, "but seeing that that is evidently impossible we have cabled our permission for his removal to the American cemetery."

#### RED CROSS DECLARES WOMEN MUST LEARN HOME CARE OF SICK

That the women of the United States have not the knowledge to enable them properly to take care of the sick in their homes and that the spread of the last year's epidemic of influenza and its toll were in a large part due to the inability of American women to care for their own sick and use proper methods as safeguards against contagion is claimed by the Red Cross, which is now offering short courses in home nursing in Evanston and throughout the country.

It is declared by the Red Cross that:

"The prevention of contagious diseases is almost entirely a matter of home hygiene, and the responsibility for the maintenance of civilian health must be borne in the immediate future more and more by the women in the home.

"The women of the country are

not adequately prepared in the absence of professional care to safeguard their homes from contagion and to nurse their families in case of minor illnesses, as has been only too evident in the recent influenza epidemic, which had a casualty list of over 400,000 in the United States.

"The conservation of the health of our people, whether in time of war or peace, is a national service as well as a home duty.

"To further universal education and protection," the Red Cross urges that every woman and girl in the country register for the course in home nursing.

About sixty north shore women are now taking the course at the Evanston Red Cross headquarters. Three hours a week are required for the instruction, for a period of six weeks. Three additional classes will soon be started. One will be given in the morning, another in the afternoon and a third in the evening. Women who wish to join the classes are asked to telephone Evanston 4060.
