The women of Christ church guild have been noted in this community for their food sales so doubtless many households will count on supplementing their home supplies from the store of cakes and jellies and rolls and pumpkin and mince pies that will be found at Mrs. Weart's table and also at the food table under the auspices of the evening guild. There will be a table of toys for the little ones and at another table will be some lovely children's clothes.

Mrs. Guthrie will be to receive donations of money to be spent on the stock or of materials of any kind or size. A Hard Times party was given at Sacred Heart church hall last Thursday evening by a group of the young women in the church.

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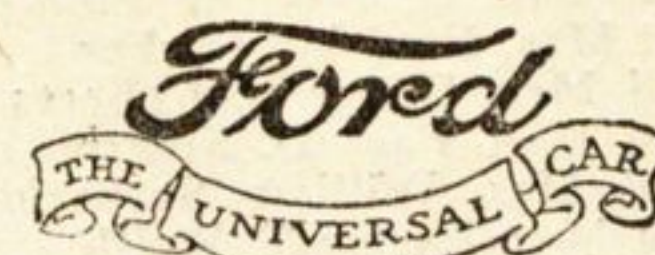

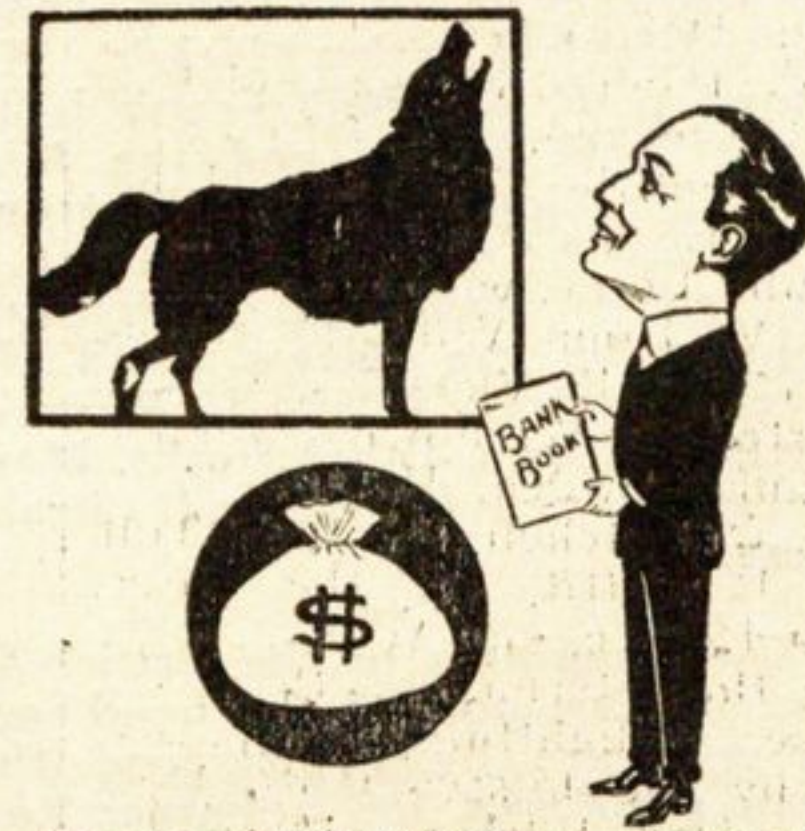
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
