WHILE EVERY ONE of us feels that Dr. Alice Barlow-Brown is the most fitted to take up the necessary work in foreign countries, it is not without regret that we see her leave Winnetka and her many friends. The latter part of next week she will leave for New York City, accompanied by two aides, to join a unit of three women who will sail on December 4, for Serbia. This unit is being sent by the Medical Women's National association, which is affiliated with the Serbian Relief committee, for the purpose of establishing a chain of hospitals in Serbia for relief work among the women and children. The work will be much the same as that done in France by Dr. Brown during the past two years.

Many old friends and patients of Dr. Brown have been entertaining her in their homes during her brief stay in the Village. On Wednesday evening Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Smith of Hubbard Woods gave a large dinner party at the Indian Hill club in her honor. Covers were laid for eighty guests. Judge Thomas Taylor, Jr., of Hubbard Woods presided, and later called on Morris L. Greeley and Merritt Starr, who spoke in appreciation of Dr. Brown's work abroad. Reverend James Austin Richards was also a speaker of the evening. On Sunday afternoon, between the hours of 4 and 5 o'clock, a reception will be tendered Dr. Brown by the residents of the Village in the assembly hall at Community House.

THERE will be a delightful musical and theatrical entertainment given in the ballroom at "Bluff Edge", the home of Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Smith in Hubbard Woods, on Wednesday evening, Dec. 3. Miss J. F. Jones of Chicago, well known contralto to all of us, will render a number of selections, and a clever little farce "Modes and Manners" will be presented by several of the young women of Winnetka. Miss May Holmes, 988 Elm street, will spend the Thanksgiving vacation at her home in Dundee, Ill.

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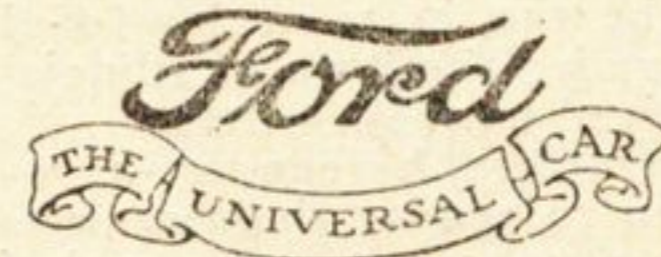

Miss Edna Harry, 988 Elm street, had as her guest last week-end, her sister, Mrs. Hewitt of Savannah, Ill.

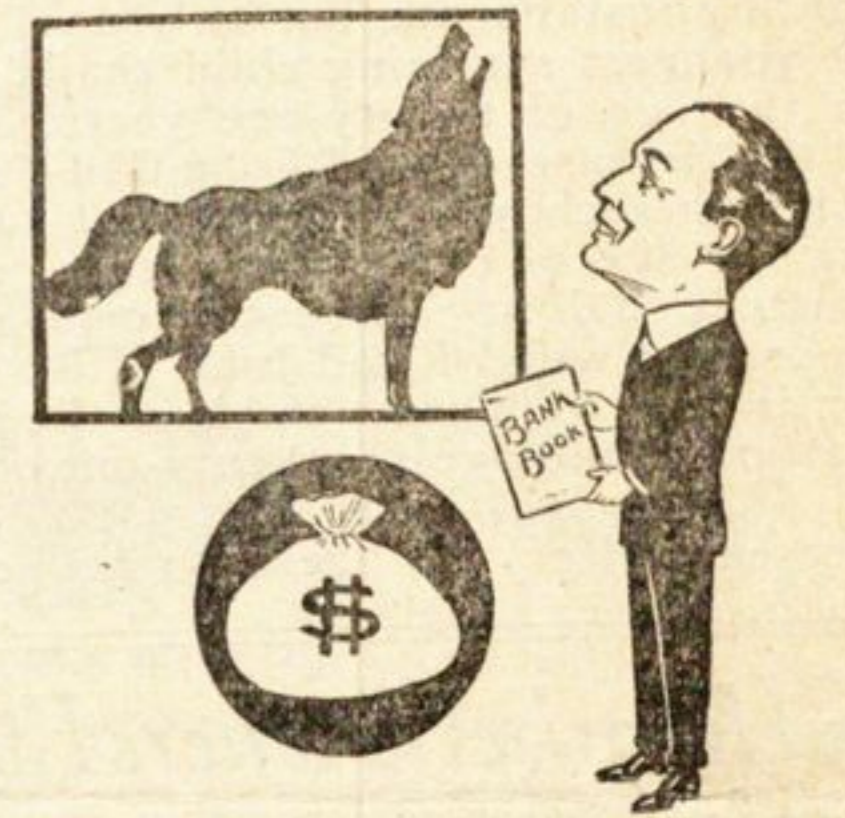
