Dr. and Mrs. Frank W. Blatchford entertained at a family dinner party on Thanksgiving Day.

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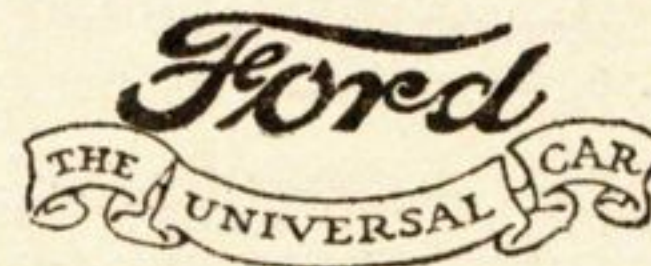

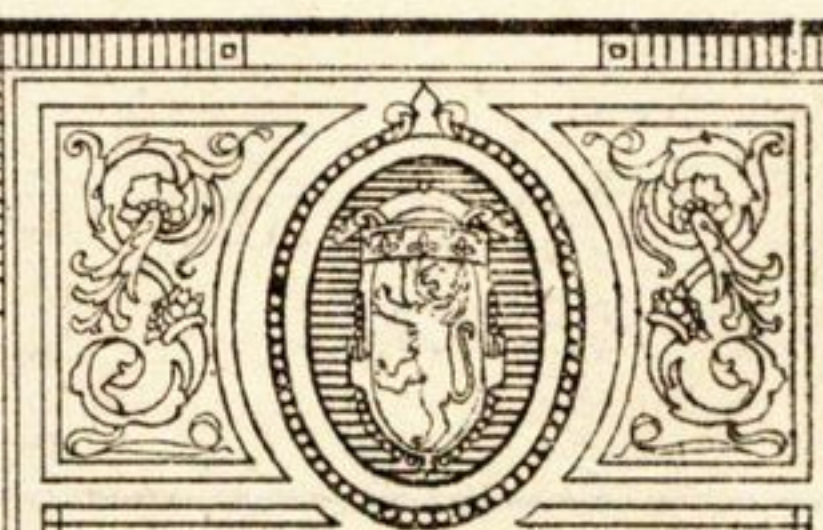

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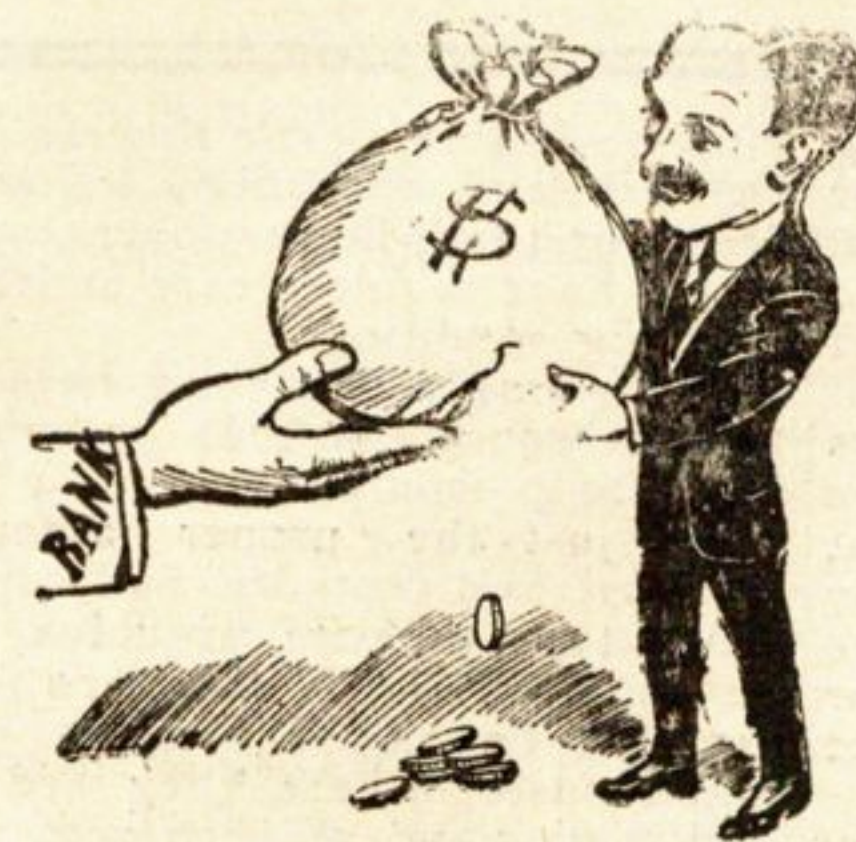
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
