WHAT IS SAID BY EXPERTS ABOUT ZONING

Residents Here Will be Interested in Review of Important Subject by Eminent Authorities

"You can't imitate any city in your zoning plan," said Edward Bassett, chairman of the New York committee on districting, speaking at the recent great zoning conference in Chicago. "The needs of each city are its own. It must have a zoning plan suited to its own conditions. You in Chicago must build up from the ground for yourselves."

Throughout his address, Mr. Bassett insisted that he was speaking from his knowledge of zoning only as zoning had been applied in New York. Again and again he reiterated that what had proved practicable in New York might not do at all for Chicago.

Best in New York

"I do not want you to think that I am telling you what you ought to do here," he said. "I am relating only what was found to be best in New York."

The methods that had been followed in putting the zoning plan into operation in that city were outlined by Mr. Bassett.

"First, he said, 'there was appointed a committee on the heights of buildings. Its only power was to report its findings on the heights of buildings. Next there was appointed under the charter, a committee from the board of estimates, made up of sixteen members, of whom only two were city officials. Its powers were to frame ordinances and maps and present them to the board of estimates."

"In New York, we believed in zoning on the comprehensive plan. There are too many dangers if the thing is done piece by piece. In California, where the cities did it in the piecemeal plan, they got nowhere, and had to back up and start all over again."

Inevitable delay and postponement, and defeat of the zoning plan in the courts were declared by Mr. Bassett to be the great objections to trying to put a zoning law into operation by any other than the comprehensive plan, which applies the law to the entire city at once.

Piecemeal Zoning Dangerous
He pointed out that the great danger in attempting zoning by the piecemeal system is that the law does not under such conditions, act uniformly, but may apply to only two or three districts in a city and leave the others, for the time, wholly unregulated and their duties in this connection are obvious.

1920 LEXINGTON CAR IS ON DISPLAY HERE

The two main points of difference over the 1919 model are the Two-Way head lights and the new Continental, four bearing crank-shaft motor. The Two-Way headlights are considered the last word in automobile illumination. They are similar to the new lamps which the Cadillac is using.

Industrial troubles in Spain have the question of diet added to the problems of wages and hours, according to a report at the Department of Commerce.

Before making a contract to cut a

crop of sugar cane, Spanish workmen recently made the following demands:

A daily wage of 10 pesetas (\$1.75); three heavy meals—breakfast of eggs and meat, dinner of soup and meat stew, supper of bacon, green vegetables and "gaspacho"; hours of work—from sun to sun, with two hours for siesta, or noon-day nap, forty minutes for each meal, three smoking periods of twenty minutes each and one for thirty minutes and a bed with two mattresses.

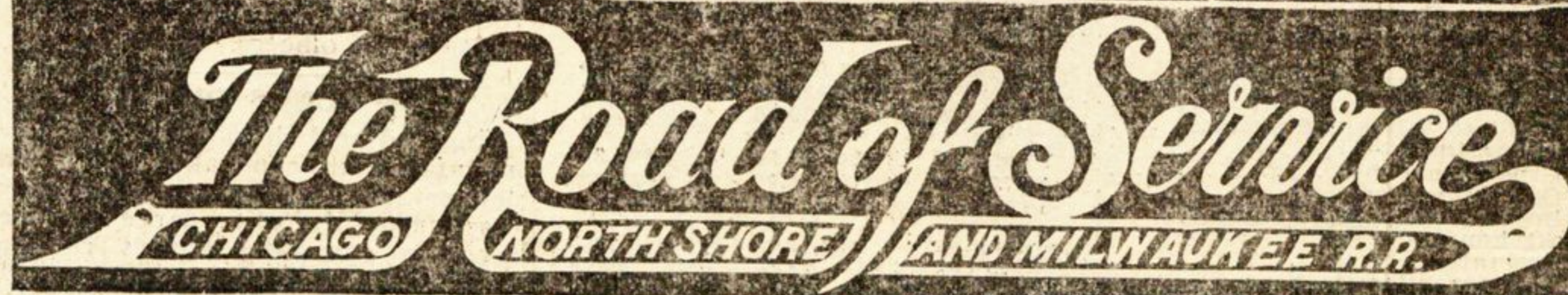
