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CAUTION! INFLUENZA ON THE NORTH SHORE

Health Officer Schneider Reports Three Cases of Influenza in Winnetka; Issues Important Health Orders

OBSERVE HEALTH RULES!

Says Residents Must Immediately Report All Cases or Suspected Cases of Influenza

The spread of the Spanish Influenza which took a heavy toll of human lives a year ago is gradually returning to the north shore.

Three cases of Influenza in Winnetka were reported to Health Officer Schneider this week. There is no desire on the part of Dr. Schneider or the Weekly Talk to frighten the residents, though it is imperative, says Dr. Schneider, that extreme care be taken by every individual and family in the Village. Strict adherance to plain health rules will result in curbing the possible spread of the malady.

Observe Regulations!

Rules laid down by the Village hours. Health department a year ago may well be applied at this time. Observance of these rules will accomplish more than any other agency in frustrating the spread of the disease. These regulations are ordered in force by Health Officer Schneider: All cases of Influenza will hereaf-

ter be quarantined and placarded. All outsiders must be excluded from the premises.

Visiting is strictly prohibited. Adult occupants who show no evidence of illness need not be confined to the premises, provided they do not

come in contact with the patient. No member of the family may attend public gatherings of any sort. All children must remain upon the

premises. Quarantine shall be terminated only by order of the Health Officer.

The period of isolation shall continue until all clinical manifestations of the disease have disappeared and the temperature has been normal for five successive days.

When slight abnormal temperature continues for more than five days after all other symptoms have disappeared, the Health Officer may in his discretion terminate the quaran-

It is the duty of the householder or the physician-when one is employed-to IMMEDIATELY report to the Health Officer, every known or suspected case of influenza.

Must Report Cases

It is likewise the duty of every person to report any case or suspected case that is not placarded, as the Illinois State Department of TRIANGLE CLUB TO GIVE Public Health makes it obligatory upon every person having knowledge of a know or suspected case of influenza, to immediately report the same to the local Health Officer.








