

"COMMITTEE OF 100" SEEKS SCHOOL FUNDS

Representatives from Entire Town Will Make House-To-House Canvases To Raise \$350,000 for new School Building

"The Committee of One Hundred" is the name given to a large organization consisting of many of Winnetka's best known and most influential citizens. Representative people from all parts of the village have volunteered their services to the Board of Education in its campaign for the erection by popular subscription of a new school on the West Elm Street site. While the committee was supposed at first to consist only of one hundred people, the desire to help in this project was so great that the committee has grown to nearly double the original number. Village Will Probe Higher Gas Appeal

Public Utility Expert Retained to Investigate Justice of Claims of Gas Company a Rate Advance

At the last meeting of the village council the village attorney was authorized to take steps to oppose the proposed increase in gas rates, at the hearing before the Public Utilities Commission on Friday, March 19. The services of Edward Bemis, public utility expert, have been retained to investigate the justice of the claims of the North Shore Gas Company for a rate advance, and to assist the village attorney in defending the interests of the village.

The attention of the council was also called to the fact that in the judgment of the Health Officer, Dr. C. O. Schneider, the two cases of typhoid fever, which recently developed in Glencoe are not attributable to the water supply of Winnetka and Glencoe. The water which is received from Lake Michigan at the Winnetka pumping station is treated with liquid chlorine, which is not in itself absolute protection, without a filtration plant. However, the samples of water which are sent three times per week to the Evanston Health Department for bacteriological analysis have shown the water to be particularly free from sewage contamination during the past few weeks. For this reason the health authorities are certain that the typhoid fever cases are attributable to some source of contagion other than the village water supply.

Proceedings by the Board of Local Improvements were instituted for the construction of a water main in Hamptondale road to connect with the existing main in Lake street, in order to provide hydrants for fire protection to the residences in the vicinity of Auburn avenue and Hamptondale road.

The petition of Mr. B. W. Blow to construct facilities for receiving

building material over the Electric road was denied, on the ground that the franchise of the Electric Road provides that no freight shall be hauled through the village. During the war, a temporary permit was given to the Electric Road to haul material for road building purposes, inasmuch as conditions made it impossible to secure shipments over the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad. In the judgment of the council, these conditions no longer obtain, and the village would not be justified in allowing an exception to the franchise. It is understood that the Village of Glencoe has also recently taken the same action.
