

BATTERY "E" HAS BIG RE-UNION IN CHICAGO

Local Members of 333d Field Artillery Turn Out in Full Force for Dinner Tuesday at Chicago

Two hundred "buddies" of Battery E of the 333d Field Artillery, made up of men from north shore towns and Evanston, held their first big re-union in the form of a banquet at the Palmer House in Chicago on Tuesday night. It was a gala occasion for the local youths, who were able, for the first time, to once more renew thrilling experiences with bunk-mates whom they hadn't seen since the battery was demobilized.

John C. Slown of Kenilworth, who had charge of the "round-up" of local members of the battery expressed gratification over the manner in which they boys turned out and also at the success of these in charge of the affair in getting practically every one of the veterans together. It was feared at first that a number of the ex-fighters would be unable to attend as many of their addresses had become lost, but through the efforts of the entertainment committee, the men were all notified.

A number of unusual features were presented during the dinner and according to the local men who attended it was "a bang-up affair."

ELECTION NOTICE

New Trier Township High School Board of Education

Public notice is hereby given that on Saturday, the 10th day of April, A. D. 1920, an election will be held between the hours of twelve o'clock noon and six o'clock p. m. of said day for the purpose of electing one member of the Board of Education for Township No. 42 North, Range 13 East, Cook County, Illinois, for a term of three years, and also one member of the Board of Education for an unexpired term of two years to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. Edwin C. Austin.

That for the purpose of holding said election the township of New Trier, being Township No. 42 North, Range 13 East, Cook County, Illinois, shall be divided into six (6) precincts, as follows:

Precinct No. 1: All that part of the village of Glencoe, Cook County, Illinois, North of Harbor Street, East of the Chicago & Northwestern right-of-way, and north of Harrison Street, West of the Chicago & Northwestern right-of-way.

Precinct No. 2: All that part of Glencoe South of Harbor Street, East of the Chicago & Northwestern right-of-way, and South of Harrison Street, West of the Chicago & Northwestern right-of-way, and all that part of the village of Winnetka, Cook County, Illinois, North of North Avenue, East of the Chicago & Northwestern right-of-way, and North of Fig Street, West of the Chicago & Northwestern right-of-way.

Precinct No. 3: All that part of the village of Winnetka South of North Avenue, East of the Chicago & Northwestern right-of-way, and South of Fig Street, West of the Chicago & Northwestern right-of-way.

Precinct No. 4: All of School Districts Nos. 37 and 40 (Gross Point) Cook County, Illinois.

Precinct No. 5: All of School District No. 28 (Kenilworth) Cook County, Illinois.

Precinct No. 6: All of School District No. 39 (Wilmette) Cook County, Illinois, and all of said Township 42 North, Range 13 East, Cook County, Illinois, not included in the above precincts Nos. 1 to 5, inclusive;

That the office of McGuire and Orr, Park Avenue, near the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad, in the village of Glencoe, is hereby designated as the polling place in Precinct No. 1 for the purpose of holding said election;

That the store of C. L. Wyman, 961 Linden Avenue, in the village of Winnetka, is hereby designated as the polling place in Precinct No. 2 for the purpose of holding said election;

That Bartz's Express Office, in Prouty Annex, in the village of Winnetka, is hereby designated as the polling place in Precinct No. 3 for the purpose of holding said election;

That the village hall in the former village of Gross Point is hereby designated as the polling place in Precinct No. 4 for the purpose of holding said election;

That the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad depot, in the village of Kenilworth, is hereby designated as the polling place in Precinct No. 5 for the purpose of holding said election;

That the village hall in the village of Wilmette is hereby designated as the polling place in Precinct No. 6 for the purpose of holding said election.

That for the purpose of holding said election the polls shall be open at the respective polling places mentioned above at the hour of 12 o'clock m., and shall remain open from such hour until the hour of 6 o'clock p. m. on the 10th day of April, 1920.
