

Urges Thrift Upon Children in Schools

Head of Federal Reserve District School Division Recommends Simple, Home-made Dresses

"Girls and boys, here's a chance to give old H. C. L. a good jolt.

"Make your own graduation dresses, girls, and let them be simple and practicable for common wear.

"As for the boys, earn the money yourself to buy your own commencement suits, if the old one looks good, don't buy a new one."

This is part of the advice given to the school boys and girls of Illinois by Mrs. Alfred J. Benson, manager of the division of schools and churches, for the Government Savings organization of the Seventh Federal Reserve District. Mrs. Benson has addressed a letter to all the school superintendents and principals of the state, boosting thrift as a means of cutting down the high cost of living. The letter is headed "Dependence or Independence—Which Are You Planning For" is as follows:

"As time draws near for plans for Commencement the Government Savings organization is suggesting with a view to thrift education:

1. That in every commencement program an essay for thrift be incorporated personal, family, neighborhood, community, city, state, national. We shall be very glad to send material which may be helpful.

2. That the girls, wherever possible, make their own graduation dresses, the materials as simple as possible, and the style one which would make it practicable for common wear.

3. That the boys, wherever possible, earn the money for their own suits, if the old one can be made to do, that they should not buy a new one.

4. That the usual flimsy, trivial, useless, and often not suitable or desired commencement gifts be replaced with War Savings stamps or Thrift stamps—a start in life which will spell success.

"The high cost problem would be quickly solved were everyone to work and save to the utmost of his ability. We know the job must be done—like Theodore Roosevelt's splendid game with his children "Through or Over but Never Around" this issue must be squarely met.

"We are counting on you to keep this matter before the pupils as a matter of patriotism and common sense."

MOODY STUDENT TO DO EVANGELISTIC WORK AT THE BRIDEWELL

Notice is hereby given to all persons interested that the Village of Winnetka, Cook County, Illinois, having ordered the improvement of Fig Street, west from and connecting with the present sanitary sewer at the intersection of Fig Street and Walden Road to a point thirty (30) feet east of the west line extended of Locust Street; of Fig Street, west from and connecting with the said proposed sewer at the intersection of Locust Street and Fig Street, five hundred thirty (530) feet; of Locust Street, south from and connecting with the proposed sewer at the intersection of Fig Street to a point eighteen (18) feet north of the south line extended of Starr Road; of Locust Street, south from and connecting with the said proposed sewer at the intersection of Starr Road and Locust Street one hundred ninety (190) feet; of Starr Road, west from and connecting with the said proposed sewer at the intersection of Locust Street and Starr Road to a point eighteen (18) feet west of the east line extended of Rosewood Avenue; of Rosewood Avenue, north from and connecting with the said proposed sewer at the intersection of Starr Road and Rosewood Avenue one hundred forty-five (145) feet; of Rosewood Avenue, north from and connecting with the said proposed sewer at one hundred forty-five (145) feet north of the intersection of Starr Road and Rosewood Avenue six hundred thirty (630) feet; of the easterly and westerly private road or easement provided, therefor in Skokie View subdivision, westerly from and connecting with the said proposed sewer in Rosewood Ave-

due to the intersection of the northerly and southerly private road or easement provided therefor in said subdivision with said easterly and westerly private road; also of said easterly and westerly private road or easement, westerly from and connecting with the said proposed sewer at the intersection of said northerly and southerly private road with said easterly and westerly private road, westerly three hundred twenty (320) feet; of the northerly and southerly private road or easement provided therefor in said Skokie View Subdivision, northerly from and connecting with the said proposed sewer at the intersection of said easterly and westerly private road with the northerly and southerly private road eight hundred (800) feet; also of said northerly and southerly private road or easement, southerly from and connecting with the proposed sewer at the intersection of said northerly and southerly private road with the easterly and westerly private road, southerly to a point eighteen (18) feet north of the southerly line of Pine Street and there connecting with the present sanitary sewer in Pine Street; of Pine Street, west from and connecting with the said proposed sewer at the intersection of said northerly and southerly private road in Skokie View subdivision with said Pine Street, west to and connecting with the present sanitary sewer at the intersection of Lake Street with Pine Street; of Ely Road, west from and connecting with said proposed sewer at the intersection of Locust Street with said Ely Road five hundred fifty (550) feet, by the construction in the said streets, avenues and road of a connected system of vitrified, salt glazed, hub and spigot tile pipe sanitary sewers, including brick masonry manholes, brick masonry drop manholes, brick masonry by-pass overflow connection manholes, connection to present manhole at the intersection of Lake Street and Pine Street, vitrified, salt glazed tile pipe

sewer junctions or slants, closed with vitrified tile discs, cast iron manhole covers, joints in pipe made with oakum and Portland cement mortar, galvanized wrought iron ladder rounds in manholes restoration of present pavement where opened, backfilling trenches with sand where said trenches are opened in said present pavement; also, including all trenching, backfilling trenches with earth, removal of all surplus excavated materials, and engineering and supervision during construction, all in the Village of Winnetka, County of Cook and State of Illinois, the ordinance for the same being on file in the office of the Village Clerk of said Village, and the said village having applied to the Superior Court of Cook County, Illinois, for an assessment of the cost of said improvement according to the benefits, and an assessment therefor having been made and returned to said Court, General Number 355171, the final hearing thereon will be held on the sixth day of July, A. D. 1920, or as soon thereafter as the business of the said Court will permit. All persons desiring may file objections in said Court before said day, and may appear on the hearing and make their defense. Said ordinance provides for the collection of said assessment in ten (10) annual installments with interest thereon at the rate of five per centum (5%) per annum.

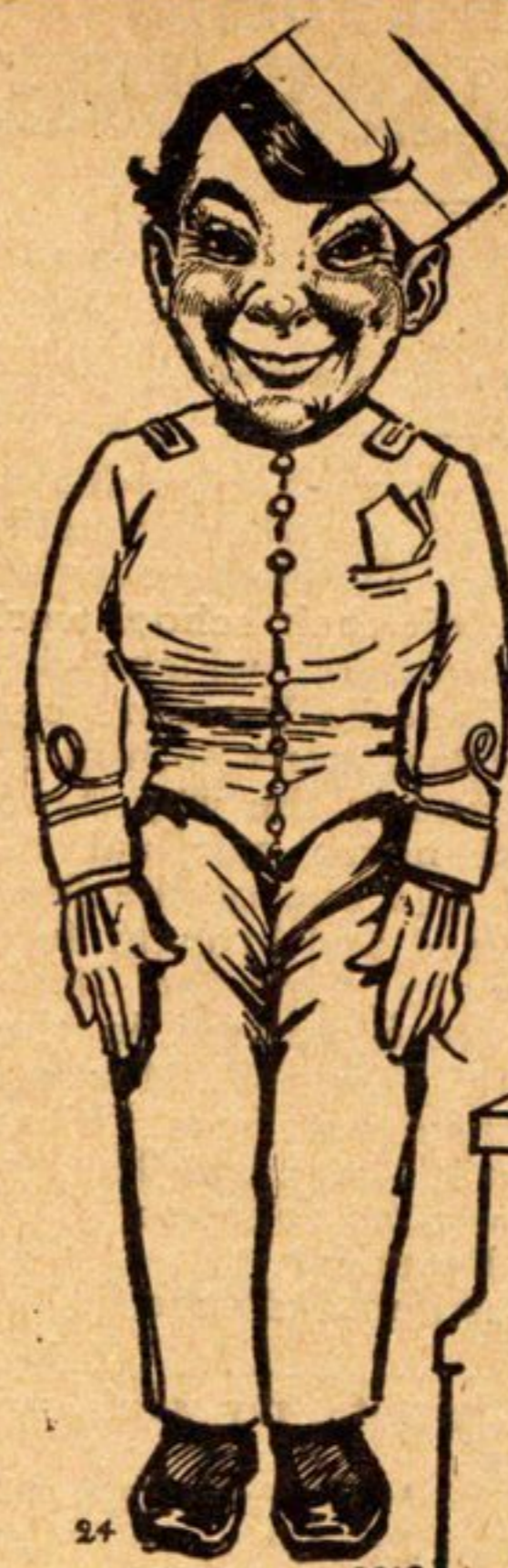
