**LUKE GRANT GIVES
VIEWS ON RAILROADS**

Praises Samuel Gompers' Theory On Government Railway Ownership Propositions

"Our theory of government, as we have said before, is that it is best when it governs least," writes Luke Grant, editor of the North Shore Bulletin, organ of the North Shore Line, in the current issue of that monthly. "Russia is a good example of the other kind, where individual liberty is lost.

"Samuel Gompers, in speaking against a resolution in favor of government ownership of railroads in the convention of the American Federation of Labor a week or two ago, said: 'No man is more loyal to government than I, but I would not give it more power over the individual citizenship of our country.'

"That expresses our personal sentiment exactly. The people who are shouting so loudly for more government control of industry are, in our judgment, overlooking the fact that they are advocating the loss of their

individual liberty. So far as the railroads are concerned, experience has demonstrated that they can be operated more economically and more efficiently under private ownership and operation.

"And aside from the questions of economy and efficiency there is no danger under private ownership of the railroads owning this government, in spite of the talk of some radicals. We are not so sure that under government ownership and operation the railroad employes would not control the government. We hardly think the other hundred million of us in this country are prepared for that.

"Probably the question may be a political issue in a few months. The republican party is opposed to government ownership and operation of railroads. At this writing the democratic party platform hasn't been adopted, but we doubt if they will have the nerve to declare in favor of government ownership of railroads.

"However, as the colored gentleman remarked, political platforms are like the platforms on street cars—they are not made to stand on but to get in on. And on that subject, honestly, doesn't it make you laugh to read about the platforms of the dif-

ferent parties? We have noticed that the politicians who are most opposed to our entering the league of nations and who advocate a policy of keeping free of foreign entanglements are the same men who are insisting that the 'Republic' of Ireland be recognized. Maybe that isn't mixing in another nation's affairs. Oh, it's a great game if you don't take it too seriously."
