

## EXPLAINS LEGION POLITICS STAND

Milton J. Foreman, Head of Illinois Legion, Says Men Stand For Principals and Not for Men

It has seemed to me appropriate that before the beginning of the first national political campaign occurring since the war with Germany and Austria, a restatement should be made, not only as a reminder to our members, but for the information of others who are now, and until November will be, unusually solicitous for the health, happiness and material prosperity of the members of our organization.

The American Legion stands for principals and not for men. It supports or opposes men only when they are closely identified with measures involving important principles.

### Representative Government

It stands for constitutional, representative government, for equality under the law, for the greatest degree of individual liberty and initiative consistent with the rights of the mass.

It opposes government for the benefit of classes, it depreciates the formation of political juntas for the support of class advantage, at the sacrifice of intelligent interest in all other governmental problems.

The Legion demands military and naval preparedness, at least in trained officers and abundance of material, so that the next generation shall not be hastily thrown into war inadequately armed and incompetently led.

Our experience shows conclusively that neither competent officers nor adequate war material can be provided between the rising and setting of the sun on the same day, however readily large numbers of inexperienced and untrained men can be mustered within that time.

### Liberty of Action

The individual members of the Legion come from all walks of life, are of various political and religious beliefs and reserve to themselves the fullest liberty of action in the exercise of their rights as citizens.

But as an organization the Legion concerns itself only with the principles and purposes for which it was organized and will never support a man or party which directly or indirectly opposes our constitutional representative government for the benefit of all classes and conditions of our citizens.

The Legion will ever keep in mind the duty our Country owes to those

who served it, and will bear in equally keen recollection those who by word, deed or act retarded the vigorous prosecution of the war and thereby became responsible for casualties which might have been avoided.

For those who were in the service the Legion demands only that consideration which all nations at all times have freely granted to those who opposed their bodies to the common enemy, that is, the care and protection by the nation for the maimed or disabled, for the families of those who made the ultimate sacrifice and an equalization of economic advantages with those who, for one reason or another, were not privileged to serve the nation at war.

## Capt. Frazer Hale Is Busy in Peace Times

Winnetka Aviator in Charge of Advance Guard of Flyers Enroute To Camp Jackson

Capt. Frazer Hale, aviator, son of Henry R. Hale, cashier of the Winnetka State Bank, is constantly achieving new honors in the service of the United States Army. The following account in the issue of July 26 of The State, Columbia, S. C., affords an interesting sidelight into Capt. Hale's activity in the service.

"Capt. Frazer Hale, Lieut. R. E. Davis, Lieut. Charles M. Cummings, Lieut. L. S. Webster and Lieut. D. G. Stitt, army aviators, arrived at Camp Jackson a few minutes before 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon, having flown from Camp Benning in less than three hours time. The aviators are flying army planes equipped with Liberty motors.

"Captain Hale is in charge of the flyers, who are an advance guard of the Flight B. Fifteenth aero squad-

ron, which is now on its way to Wilmington. The entire flight is now in transit, so to speak, the equipment, men and material being enroute to Wilmington via seven railway cars composing a special train.

### Make Record Flight

"Capt. Hale and his flyers left Montgomery about 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning, stopping over at Camp Benning, Columbus, Ga., for a little more than an hour. The four planes arrived here shortly before 6 o'clock, passing over the city and attracting considerable attention. A safe landing was made on the new flying field at Camp Jackson, near the artillery range. Capt. Hale, who has visited Columbus several times, said last night they were in the air approximately three hours on the trip.

"Capt. Hale and Lieut. Davis were here about a month ago on the southward trip as were several other aviators. They have been flying around in Florida, Louisiana and other states."

### ECKHART ANNEXES SILK SHIRT FOR CIRCUIT HIT

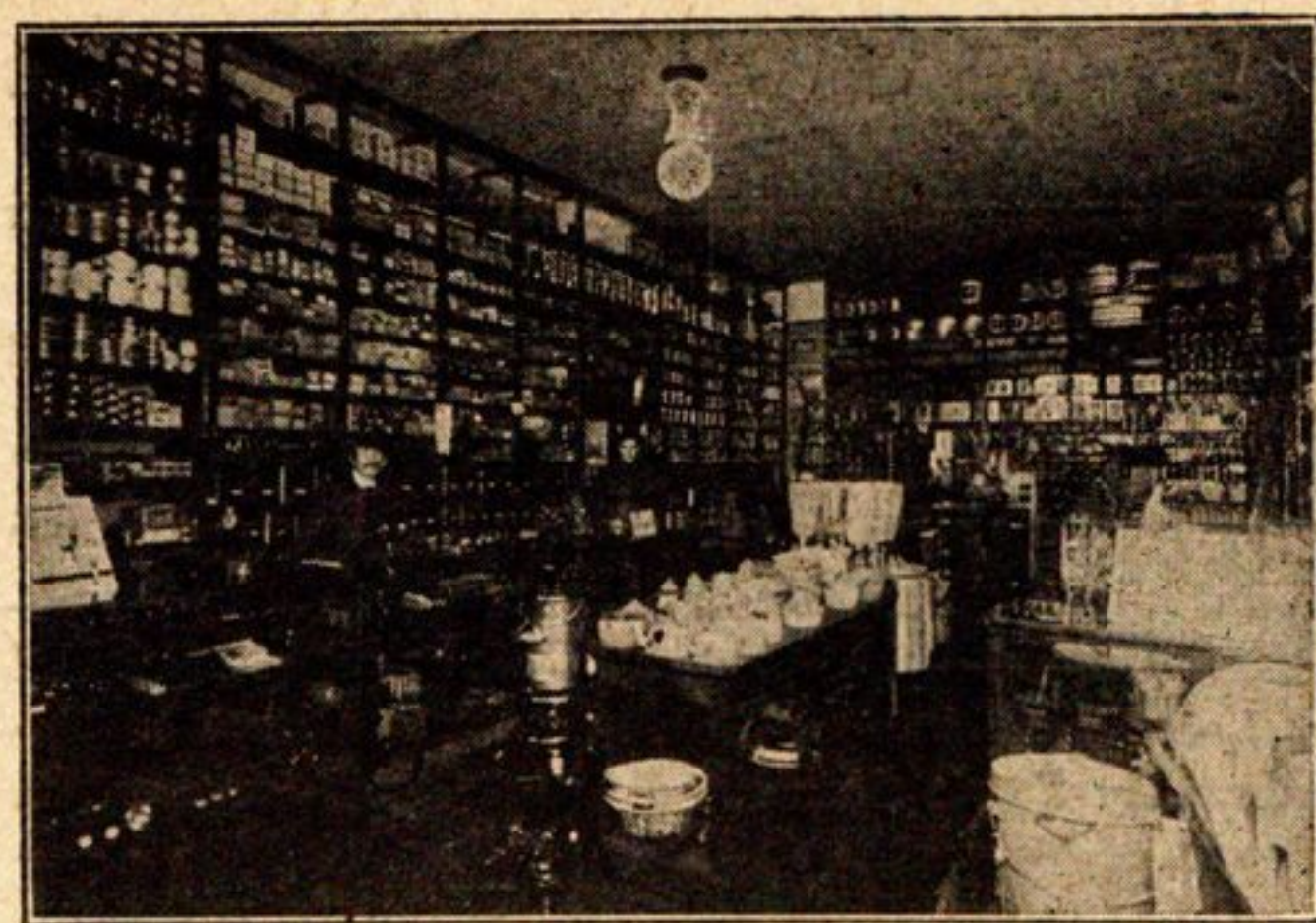
