In 1918, Lusk made his American debut in New York City and has since filled with success many engagements in the western, southern and eastern states.

RENOVATE "Y" GYM FOR BIGGEST WINTER SEASON

Announce Preparation for Better Accommodating Men; Many North Shore Members at Evanston

Announcement was made this week by O. E. Friedland, physical director of the Evanston Y. M. C. A., of the work in repair and redecoration which is now being done on the "Y" gymnasium.

"The board of directors have authorized an extensive program of redecoration," he said. "The walls, woodwork, etc., in the swimming pool will be covered by a coat of white enamel, as also will the shower room. There will be a new tile floor in the shower room."

"In the physical rooms, hallways and gymnasium the walls, floors and apparatus are being washed and put into shape. When we have finished we expect to have the entire gymna-

sium in better shape than it has been for some years."

Mr. Friedland stated that he expected the work to be finished by September 20, at which time the classes will be renewed and registration begun for the winter season. The winter program is now in process of preparation and will be announced early next week.

30,000 YEARS OLD

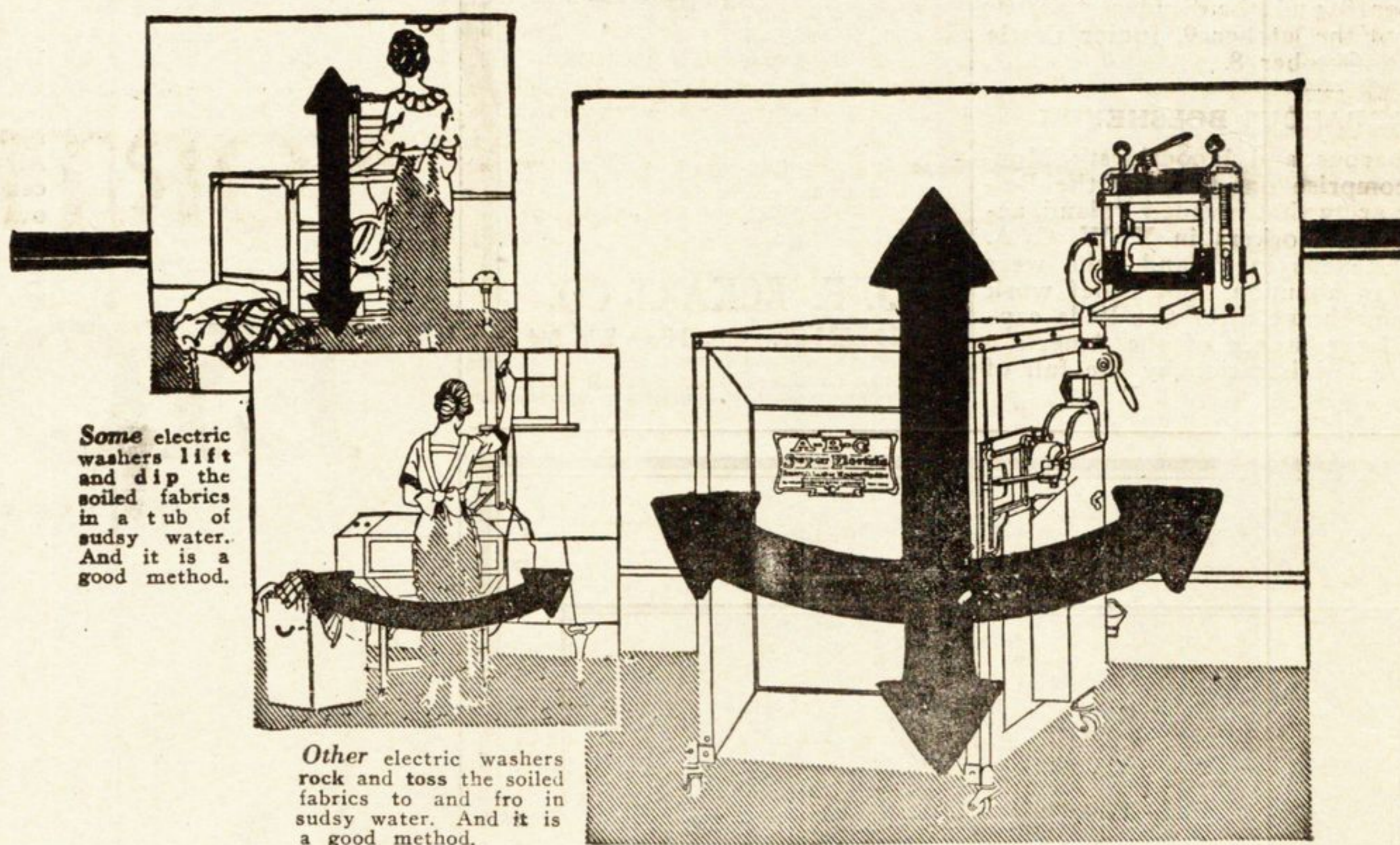
