RESCUED FROM LAKE BY CAPTAIN CARLAND

Chicago Couple Nearly Exhausted
When Launch Springs Leak in
Sunday Squall

Another mark was put down on the credit side of the ledger for Captain Charles Carland of the Evanston coast guard station Sunday night when he and his crew rescued two persons from a sinking boat off Wilmette after a four-hour battle with wind and wave.

Edward Times, 1321 Nort Dearborn street, Chicago, accompanied by Miss Jeanette Drake, 4750 Kenmore avenue, Chicago, set off from the municipal pier Sunday afternoon in Time's 16-ton, 50-foot launch, "The Florida".

Bound for Wilmette

They were bound for Wilmette. Shortly after 8 o'clock a squall blew up, and the boat from some undetermined cause sprung a leak. Bailing with might and main the two were unable to keep the water from the engine and the motor soon died, leaving them to drift aimlessly with the wind.

Captain John Anderson and a crew of five surfmen immediately set out from the coast guard station at the mouth of the river and Captain Carland being notified shortly after set out from the coast guard station at Church street.

Captain Carland sighted the disabled launch about six miles to the southeast with a distress signal set and reached the boat some ten or fifteen minutes before it would have sunk. The two passengers were almost exhausted and were brought to Wilmette harbor where after a short rest they were able to go to their homes.

Captain Carland and his crew bailed out the boat and brought it into harbor safely.

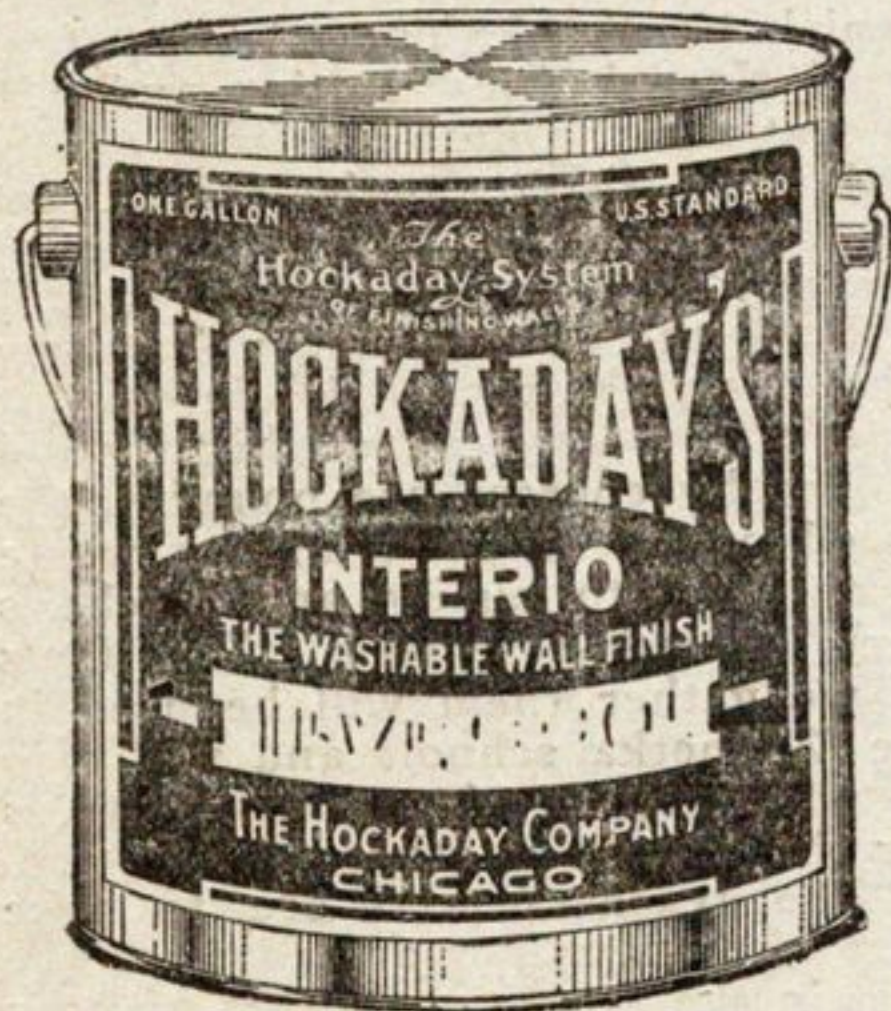
