The cabinet members accompanied about 150 delegates to the International Radio Commission down the river to Norfolk on the Mayflower and talked to the aviators flying over the vessel as she steamed down

Captains Fraser and Walter Lawson of Langley Field were the officers in two fast planes who flew above the Mayflower and held telephonic communication with the men on the vessel several thousand feet below.


