"Invisible Guest" Certificates on Sale At Local Express Office at Northwestern Station.

"Invisible guest" certificates, which can be purchased for any amount from \$1 up, are on sale at the local office of the American Railway Express company, Northwestern station.

With the action, the local office takes its place among the numerous agencies throughout the country co-operating with Herbert Hoover, chairman of the European Relief council, in his efforts to raise \$33,000,000 by means of a national collection for the relief of incipient starvation among 3,500,000 children in the war-stricken countries of central and eastern Europe. Through the authorization of G. C. Taylor, president of the American Express company and the American Railway Express company, the "invisible guest" certificates have been placed on sale at 25,000 of the company's offices throughout the United States.

The cost of saving one child until the acute condition has been relieved by the next European harvest is \$10, but donations of smaller sums are welcome, and a contribution of only \$1, under the economical administration of the council, will keep life in a little body for a month. The smallest donations are encouraged among the employes of the express company.

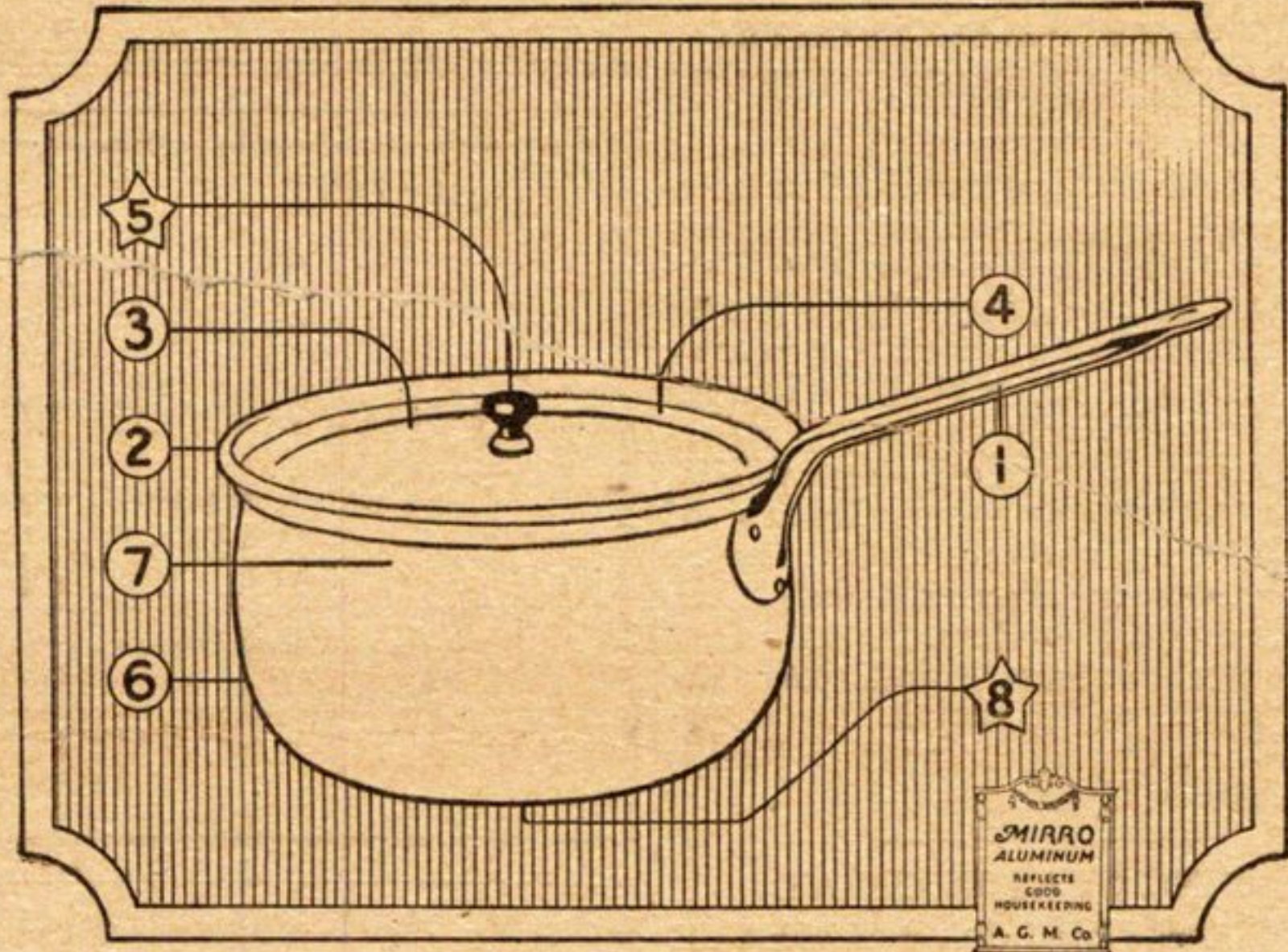
