NEW GLENVIEW HOME NEARS COMPLETION

Clubhouse Will Be Ready for Occupancy May 1; Approximate Reproduction of Former Structure

According to information received from the contractors, the new Glenview Golf club now being erected on the site of the structure which was destroyed by fire late last spring, will be completed and ready for the formal opening May 1.

The erection of the new building has advanced very rapidly since the work began last August. It will be as nearly as possible an exact reproduction of the former structure. was the desire of the members that it

should be so built.

Old English Style The style of architecture is old English. In the main dining room on the first floor the exposed trusses are of huge oak timbers, and on the outside of the building will also be exposed oak timbers. At the front entrance there will be erected a small porch, the material of which is from the old frigate "Constitution," of the war of 1812.

On the first floor of the east wing of the building are the men's locker rooms, showers and dressing rooms. There will be room for 400 lockers, and some fifty or sixty private shower rooms. The dining room and the kitchen occupy the first floor of the north wing. On the first floor will also be a large lounging room and a cafe, to be used on special occasions and at times when the main dining room is not needed.

Family Apartments

The upper floor has family apartments, and bachelors' quarters. There are eleven apartments for families and seventeen single suites.


