During the year 1920 there were reported to the State Department of Public Health over 336,000 cases of communicable diseases, and over 120,000 deaths from all causes in the State of Illinois. In the light of these statistics it has seemed to me fitting that a time should be appointed, by competent authority, during which every community of the State shall take concerted action looking to the betterment of local conditions of sanitation, instruction of the people in the practice of hygiene, determination of the causes of communicable diseases, and the prevention and spread, so far as possible, of such diseases.


