Bids Received On Filtration Plant

At the last meeting of the Village Council proposals for the construction for the filtration plant were received. Bids from fourteen contract ors were opened, the lowest figure for the building being that of Hoeffer & Company of Chicago for \$72,390. The low bid for filtration equipment was received from the American Water Softner Company of Philadelphia, being \$58,756.

The total amount exceeded the engineers estimate by about \$10,000.

It was decided to postpone acceptance of the bids until Monday evening, April 11, in order to enable the


