Last Saturday evening there was an informal buffet supper and dance at the Indian Hill Golf club. Harvey's orchestra played.

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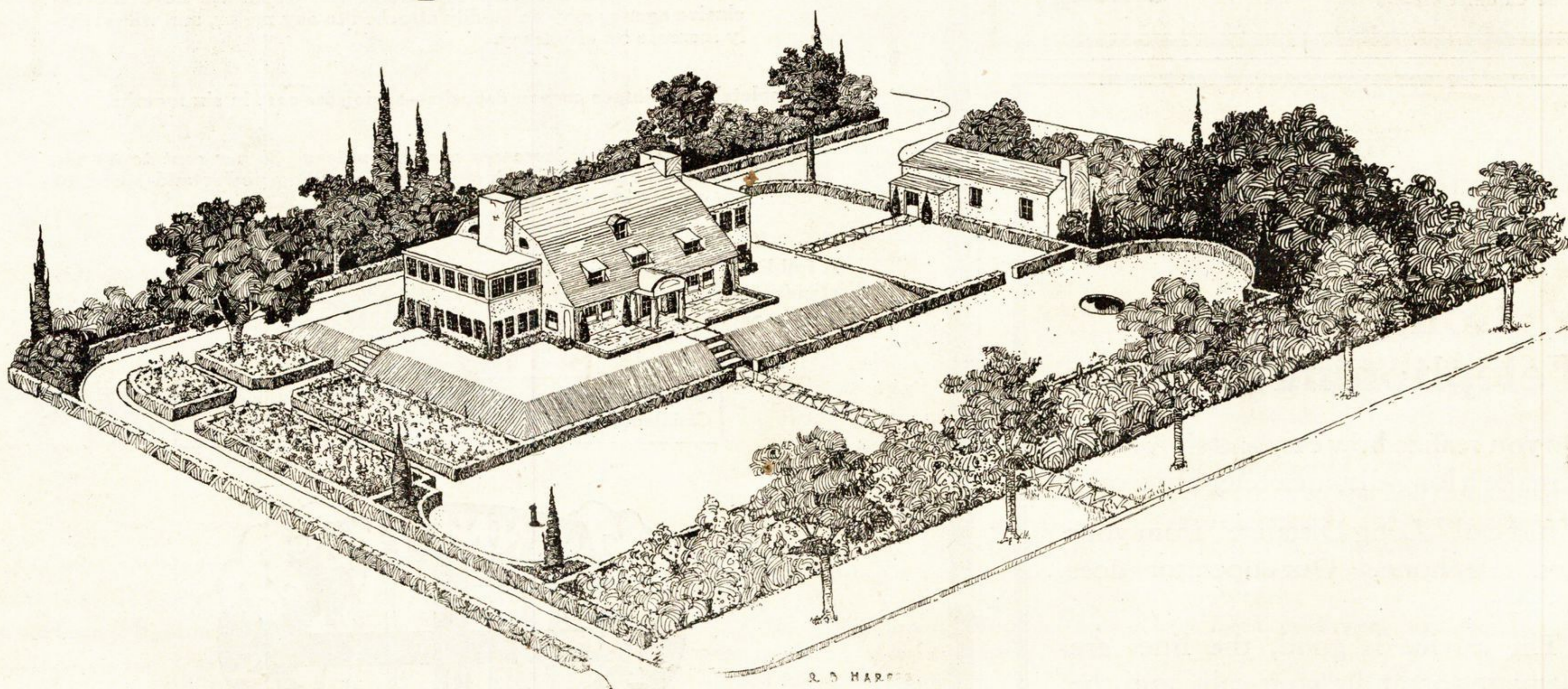
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
