The Camp Fire Girls of Chicago and suburbs are making preparations for their pageant "Spring time", symbolical of their eager, young lives, which is to be given at Aryan Grotto temple on the night of June 11.

There will be chants and songs and dances that will take you to the hillside and the forest glens. The pageant will also show the routine of camp life, with the various activities, such as cooking, sewing, basket-weaving and woodcraft that go with it. Several hundred girls will take part.

The proceeds will go toward maintenance of the summer camp on the sand dunes near South Haven—Kiwano Na-Wa-kwa, as it is called. The camp is made up of hundreds of wigwams, where the girls live after the primitive manner of the Indians.

Here, during the summer, merit beads are won; green beads for creative work accomplished; flame-colored beads for home service; red for health; yellow for business qualities; red, white and blue for patriotism; blue for nature study, and purple for honors achieved. These beads make a decorative trimming to the ceremonial robes.

"The influence this organization has on the future woman," said Mrs. J. M. Moody, the camp mother, "can be best realized from a brief summary of the activities of a tribe. The girls learn to sew and cook and nurse. They are taught many handicrafts. They learn to carve in wood and make furnishings for their forest retreats. They make clothing for homeless children and our girls even have adopted a little Belgian orphan. "At camp, in their costume of middies and bloomers, they participate in the most active kind of games and athletics, and take long hikes into the country.

"In their songs, dances, pantomimes

and domestic tasks they are acquiring freedom from restraint, girlish grace and confidence. And, most of all, they are forming lifelong friendships and developing love and sympathy for others."

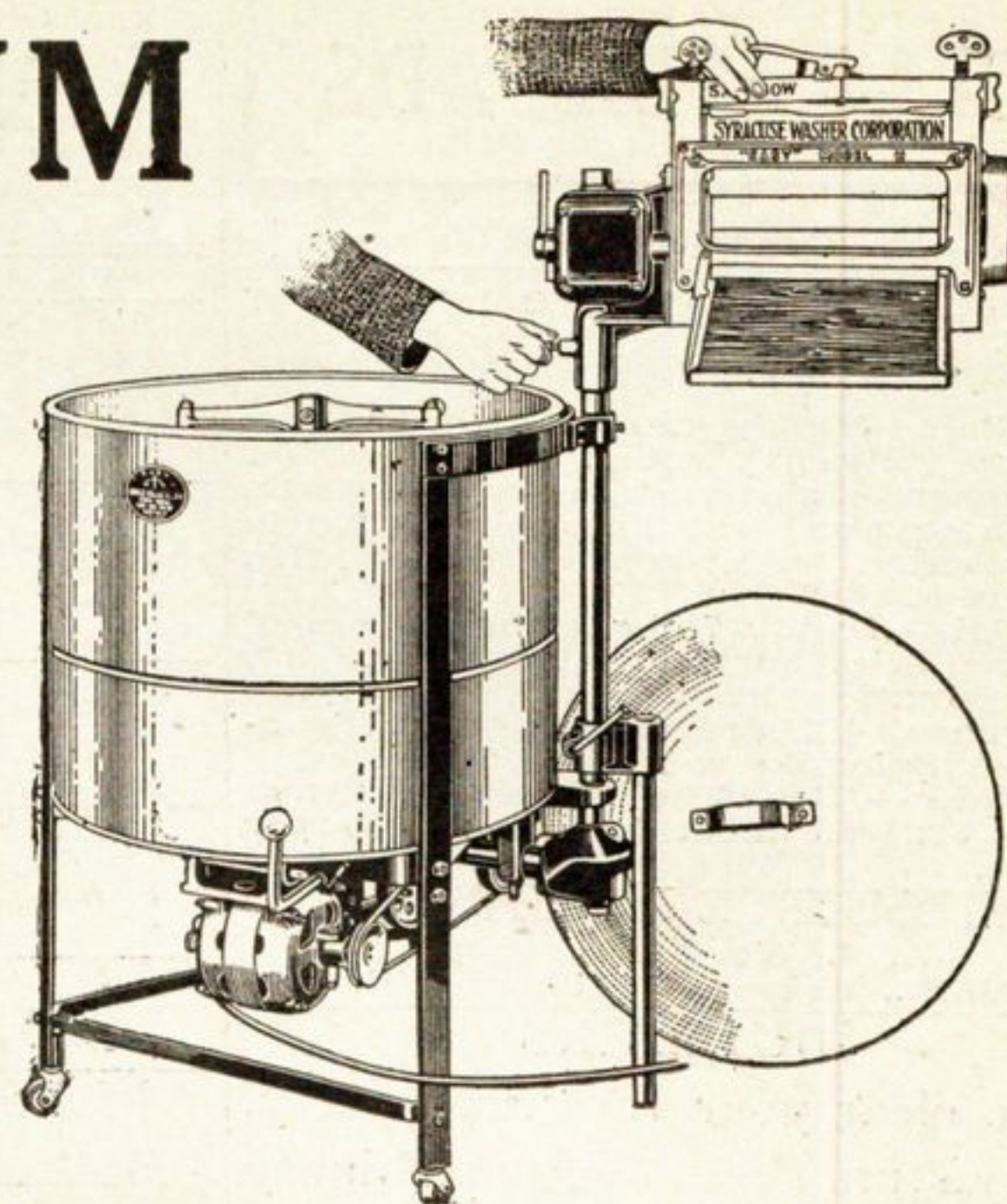
