McConathy, conducting. The Children's Chorus has sung at the festival since its beginning, thirteen years ago, and has become one of the regular features of festival week. At present the chorus consists of children from the schools of Evanston, Wilmette and Glencoe, and numbers approximately 1,500 of the children of the sixth, seventh and eighth grades. A large number of choruses and cantatas have been sung during these festivals, all with the accompaniment of the complete orchestra and all in a manner which has made the Children's Concert well known not only to the patrons of the festival but to the country at large.

The children who will sing at Ravinia are selected from the intermediate schools of Evanston. This selection is made because it is the most practical way of grouping together a number of children who know the festival music.

The program this year proved to be unusually interesting. The Cantata by Webbe, "An Island Fable", deals with the story of a mouse and an elephant. Each was provoked at his size and envied the other. 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




