

**"Swat The Fly Now" Says Health Notice**

**County Public Health Service Issues Information Asking Public to War Against Pest**

Cook County Public Health Service, Harriet Fulmer, director, issues some "swat the fly" information this week which it is asked that every householder heed.

"The fly is one of man's most dangerous enemies," reads the notice. "He breeds in filth. He carries filth and disease germs on everyone of his six hairy feet. Eighty-four million germs have been found at a time on a single fly. A female fly wintered over has almost fifty-four million progeny by October. To prevent his breeding:

Keep yards clear of all waste. Keep garbage covered tight and pails clean.

Cleanliness will starve the fly out. Buy a fly swatter now or make a fly trap. Keep all foods covered and your house well screened. Money spent for screens may save a doctor's bill. Keep flies away from the sick room and all dishes and clothing coming from the sick room.

**Removing Ink Stains.**  
Pyrophosphate of soda is recommended for the removal of ink stains. This salt does not injure vegetable fiber and yields colorless compounds with the ferric oxide of the ink. It is best to first apply tallow to the ink spot, then wash in a solution of pyrophosphate until both tallow and ink have disappeared. Another formula is to use a mixture of four parts of tartar and two parts of powdered alum. This is not injurious to cloth. Other stains also may be removed with it.

**This "Earth" Largely Water.**  
A trifle more than seven-tenths of the surface of the globe is covered by the waters of the oceans. The total area covered by the latter exceeds the total area of the lands of the world by 83,000,000 square miles. Reckoned in terms of quantity, the oceans contain 324 cubic miles of fluid, or 14 times the bulk of all the lands in the world above sea level.

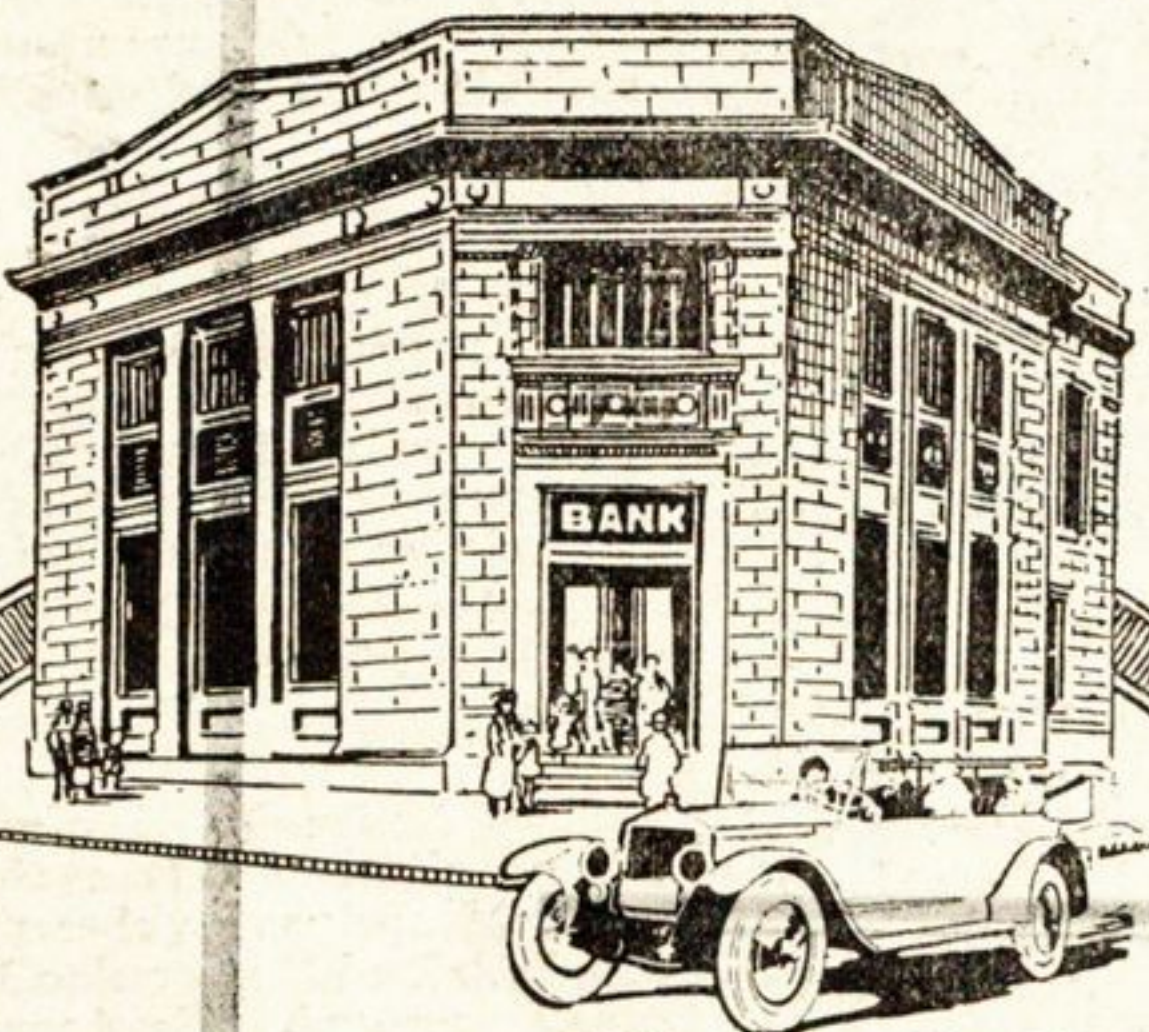

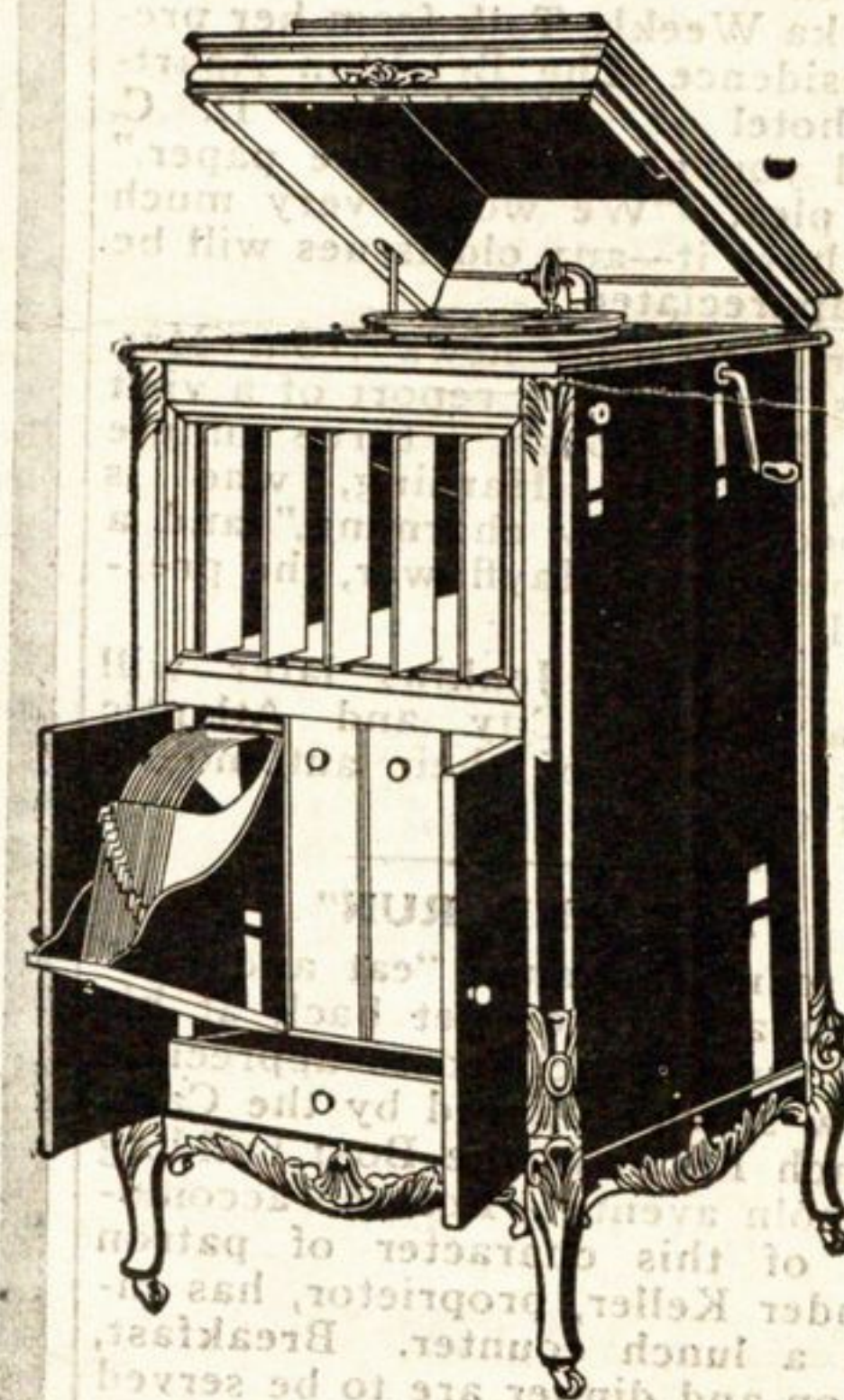
