Anxious to Work

"Willing to fight; anxious to work", is a slogan at the Pageant of Progress at the Municipal Pier which has attracted a great deal of attention there. Like the Chicago Tribune's slogan at the first of the year, "1921 will reward fighters", this declaration exemplifies the spirit not only of the ex-service men of the American legion, but of most of the men of the nation. Young men who have not yet become imbued with the idea of doing as little as possible and collecting as much as possible, are the hope of the nation today. Every American citizen, particularly during months which are immediately before us, should remember those two phrases: "Willing to fight; Anxious to work" and "1921 will reward fighters".

Purging Baseball

"Black Sox" or "White Sox" is the great question before baseball fans today. The acquittal of the ball players and gamblers who had been tried for throwing the 1919 world series, has put the question straight up to Comiskey and Judge Landis. Should they or should they not be allowed to play in organized baseball hereafter? They have been tried and found "not guilty" and the presumption, therefore, is that they neither conspired to throw the game nor actually threw the game in that series. But it is going to be hard for many baseball enthusiasts to be convinced that they played an absolutely fair game. Whether of not they are technically guilty of a crime if these ball players did permit games to be lost or won without profit to themselves, then they were as unsportsmanlike as they would have been had they done it for actual money and had the state been able to secure convictions and confinement in the penitentiary. No matter what the result of the trial, Comiskey and Judge Landis can

probably be depended upon to use these instances as a means to purge the great American game and make it clean for years to come.

The Roman Holiday

The death of a professional aviator who leaped from a racing aeroplane by means of a parachute at the Pageant of Progress in Chicago Sunday, lays fresh emphasis on the needless stunt performances of such daredevils who lend no advantage to the development of navigation of the air. It is a shameful commentary on the American people that such Roman holiday attractions are condoned. Development of safety devices and means of escape from falling planes can be and is more satisfactorily and sanely developed by other means than stunt exhibitions in connection with picnics, county fairs and circuses.

UNCLE SAM ON THE JOB CUTTING OUT BARBERRY

The Barberry shrub must come out, is the order of the United States Department of Agriculture at present

engaged in weeding out the destructive shrubs in this vicinity. H. E. Brewbaker and W. H. Nuttall of the Department of Agriculture are on the job on the north shore making a survey of every property in this section of Cook county. They

have been at work this week pulling out the Barberry in the district east of Sheridan Road, having recently completed the survey and eradication work in Lake County where more than 15,000 bushes were "pulled out". These workers will inspect every

property in the village by order of the government, the law providing for the eradication of the shrub.

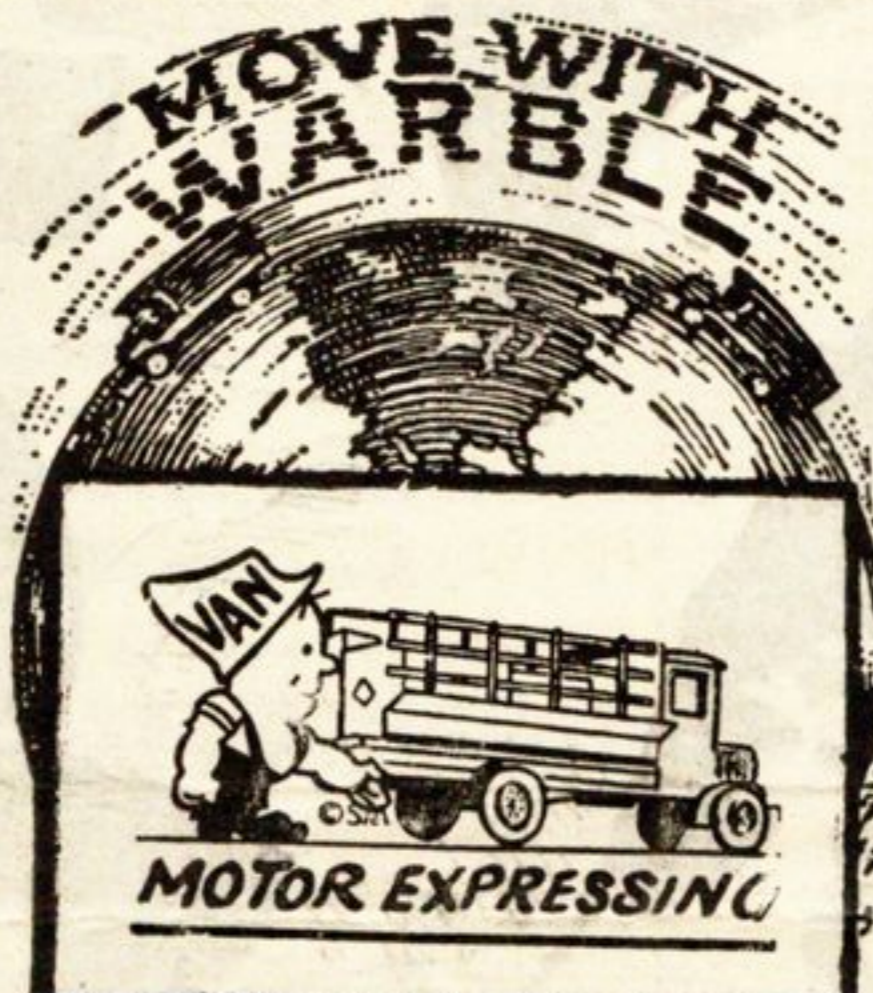
