Urbana, Ill.—Is newspaper work drawing more young men and young women to it because of its undying fascination? It must be. Listen:

The largest enrollment in journalism courses in the history of the University of Illinois is announced this year. A total of 128 students is enrolled. Of this number, 157 are taking the introductory course in which they learn something of the workings of a newspaper and something about news writing. There are 12 in the copy reading and head writing course, 37 doing editorial writing and 22 studying the history of American journalism.

Dr. Franklin W. Scott is director of the University's courses in journalism.
