PROHIBITIONISTS SCORE
EX-ATTY GEN'L PALMER

Washington.—An attack on former Attorney General Palmer and a number of senators is made in a statement issued recently by the board of temperance, prohibition and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church regarding the beer regulations issued last week by secretary of the Treasury Mellon, and based upon the decision of Palmer "that doctors may prescribe unlimited booze."

"No one had any respect for Palmer's decision when he gave it," said the statement, "and no one has any respect for it now, may be that Palmer could be appointed to some office again, but unless we miss our guess, he could not be elected dog catcher for Poland."

The statement says that Mellon's decision to put these regulations into effect is "most unfortunate and is contrary to the general policy of the administration."
