Washington.-An attack on former Attorney General Palmer and a number of senators is made in a statement issued recently by the board of temperance, prohibition and public morals of the Methodist Episcopal church regarding the beer regulations issued last week by secretary of the Treasury Mellon, and based upon the decision of Palmer "that doctors may prescribe unlimited booze."
